

TEAMSTER CALLED IN THOMAS CASE

John Borgan, Stableman, Had to Whip Boys to Keep His Job, He Says.

USED STRAP ON A HANDLE.

One Boy Kept Twelve Days on Bread And Water—Escaped from Hospital After Being Patient.

(Special to the "News.")

Open. June 18.—Further testimony of a revolting character was produced at the hearing of the charges of brutality against H. H. Thomas, superintendent of the industrial school, this morning. Valentine Gibson and Judge A. G. Agee appeared for the citizen's committee, conducting the investigation, and T. D. Johnson and C. R. Hollingsworth appeared for Thomas.

The first witness called was Lamont Holmes, a former teamster in charge of the industrial school barn. Holmes admitted he performed himself some weeks ago in making statements against Mr. Thomas before O. A. Kennedy. He stated today that he whipped the King boy as directed by Thomas. The boy had been in the cell, Holmes said, for 12 days on bread and water, and was taken to the hospital and later escaped. As to the food provided at the institution, witness stated that it was unfit to eat. In reply to Thomas' attorneys, he said he had a personal grudge against Thomas for the reason that Thomas held back a \$10 check of his wages, because witness let a boy escape from the school. Witness said Thomas had cut off \$70 recently for five head of Holstein cattle which were found to be infected with tuberculosis.

John Borgan, who was with the barn detail, was the next witness. He stated he was also in charge of the painting at the school. Borgan told of three boys who had been in cells three weeks on bread and water. They were taken out to work in the daytime and made to work, and were put back in the cells at night. Witness told of a number of boys who were whipped under the direction of Superintendent Thomas and Assistant Superintendent Kneass. The boys were whipped with a piece of leather two inches wide and attached to a wooden handle. The boys were stripped when whipped.

Harry Joseph, who is president of the investigating board, asked witness why he whipped the boys. Borgan replied: "I had to whip them to hold my job."

The witness was still on the stand this afternoon, when hearing was resumed at 2 p. m. There will be a night session this evening.

BOYS CONFESS TO MAKING COUNTERFEIT COIN

San Francisco, June 17.—Two young men, Harry Malher and Richard Howard, both under 19 years of age, were arrested today by U. S. Commissioner Heckcock and held to answer for counterfeiting. A complete outfit for the making of spurious 10-cent and 25-cent pieces, together with over 200 bogus quarters, dollars, were found in their rooms in the St. George hotel. The youths confessed to secret service officers that within a week they would have been making half-dollars. They are believed by the authorities to have placed in circulation many bogus coins in and about this city.

DECREE UNCONSTITUTIONAL.

Caracas, June 17.—The high federal court has declared unconstitutional Castro's decree of January, 1907, which annulled the salt and match monopolies. The decision restores to the Ethelberg syndicate, limited, of London, all its rights. Albert Pain, director in the monopoly companies, successfully carried through the negotiations.

CARDINAL GIBBONS OPPOSED TO SUFFRAGE FOR WOMEN

Emmettsburg, Md., June 17.—In an address to the girl graduates of St. Joseph's college and academy today, Cardinal Gibbons declared against woman suffrage, saying, in part:

"I am entirely opposed to woman suffrage, because I hate the women for I love them and want them to fulfill the mission for which God intended them. If you play in the arena of politics you will be covered with its dust. If you grasp too much you will lose everything. Where are women so honored as in the United States? This is largely due to the chivalry and courtesy of the men, and if you are protected by the male sex, what more do you want?"

"I want to remind you that women have a great mission in life. You should therefore have a deep sense of your responsibility in the domestic walks of life. You cannot hope to preach in the church, but you can preach in your homes and reach those with whom you come in contact in your daily lives. Preach to your fathers and brothers. Woe be to society if it had to depend upon the male sex, it would certainly go to the devil."


MANY CASUALTIES IN BUNKER HILL CELEBRATION


