There does not seem to be any effectual means offered as yet to destroy the pest, but I am inclined to think it is for the want of a little trouble on the part of the folks. of their fruit trees? I always found that the best thing to clean fruit trees from blight of any kind; if it will answer well on a small scale, why not on a large one? Any old refuse will do to make a smoke, rags being the best if they can be had, as they make a strong I should take advantage of the Put the fire where the wind will smell wind. blow it right through the orchard. I have proved this method to be the best that can be employed. If 1 had fruit trees affected with blight that is just what I should do, and I would that warrent success. If you don't succeed the first time, try, try again.

MILDEW ON THE GOOSBERRIES,

will give you my experience. bought some trees about seven years ago, and planted them in my small gar den. The first and second years of bearing they mildewed, etc. 1 tried many experiments before I found out the cure, but I found it at last and very simple indeed it is. When the tree is in blossom and the fruit begins to kuit, clear every thing away from around the tree to allow it plenty of air; then put a layer of dry wood ashes as far around as the boughs extend to the depth of two inches. It is no use when the mildew has set in, as it will not clear it off. My gooseberries ripened out beautifully last year, and I have something over 20 trees now in fine blosson, which I do not expect to be troubled at all with mildew.
