

### COAL DISTRICTS' DISTRESS.

Instances of the terrible suffering resulting from the strike.

MASSACHUSETTS, October 20th, 1893.—"When will this strike end?" This is a question on the lips of nearly every person you meet. For the past two or three weeks it has been a topic that a settler would be sure to hear, and the distress is still increasing. About a fortnight ago some of the men of prominent towns of Yorkshire met with representatives of the strike and made a plan to be followed. The decision of the men was that the strike should be continued until December 1st (this year) and that a reduction of 10 per cent. would be made. This decision was rejected by the miners themselves upon the condition that, while the miners (a few of them) should be permitted to work, the others should be paid a reduction of 10 per cent. of the strike money.

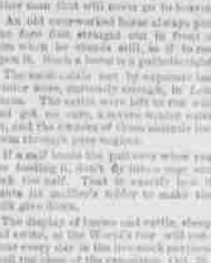
