TO BUILD CONCENTRATOR.

George L. McKay, president of the China Consolidated Mines company, has just returned here from the copper properties owned by the company in the vicinity of Valdez, Alaska. He now is busily engaged preparing plans for the construction of a concentrator of sufficient capacity to handle the output from the 37 full size copper claims owned by the company in the section. Of these properties the Stelmans mine is believed to be the richest but in addition the China owns eight copper claims in the Oxide group. In the Oxide group and also in the Potosi group, all located along Landlocked Bay. The China also owns 43 placer gold claims in the China and Chisochina rivers, as well as the townsite of Chisok at the junction of these rivers.

Chicago, Dec. 7.—There was a good trade in wheat today. At the start there was considerable selling by commission houses as the result of liberal receipts in the northwest and to eastern cities. Thereafter the market rallied on covering and the early losses were regained. May opened 1/2 to 1/4 lower to a shade higher at 1.01 1/2 to 1.01 3/4, soft-off to 1.01 1/2 and advanced to 1.02. Trading in corn was quiet. The market was steady and featureless. May opened 1/2 lower at 56 1/2, sold at 56 and later advanced to 56 1/2@57. Trading in soybeans was in May out. The market was firm, with May up 1/2 at the opening at 53. After touching 53 1/2 the price advanced to 54. Soybeans were dull and weak. A 15 cent decline in the price of live hogs was the chief influence in the market. May pork was off 1/4 at 12.90. Lard was 1/2 cents lower, at 15.00. Hides were down 10 cents at 60.
