EASTERN DISPATCHES.

CHICAGO, 27.—Private dispatches from Cincinnati state that the contest for the Presidential nomination is narrowed to Adams and Davis. Davis is almost certain of the nomination. There is no doubt that the West generally, with the exception, perhaps, of Ohio, will strongly oppose Adams. A special telegram from Washington to the Associated Press, dated Monday, says that Davis and Curtis will be nominated.

ST. LOUIS, 27.—A gentleman just in from the terminus of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad, Indian territory, says the railroad company moved their terminus from Muskogee to Oklaheoke last Monday, and found the place in possession of white desperadoes, under the leadership of a man named "Tiger Hill," who refused to leave. General Pope was telegraphed for assistance, and Lieut. Quincy had a detachment of fifteen men was ordered down from Fort Hiley, and when our informant left, Lieut. Quincy had arrived and notified the outlaws to leave the territory or suffer the consequences; but they still refused and a collision between them and the military was imminent.

NEW YORK.—The general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church will convene at Brooklyn on Monday; 454 delegates will be present, and the Book Concern trouble will be adjusted. Numbers twenty-four and twenty-six of the Standard, were burned last night. Some men at work on the fourth floor were burned to death, the rest escaped, one leaping fifty feet to the shed below unhurt.

WASHINGTON, 27.—The alteration of the postal bill telegraphed yesterday, increasing the China mail subsidy appropriation and changing the port to some Pacific port instead of sending it to San Francisco, was faintly written in pencil, and the other amendments to black ink. Several correspondents failed to discover the alteration in reading the section when reported, therefore it is believed it has been made subsequently. The California representatives announce the new dog vigorously. Some think it was precipitated for the purpose of distracting attention partially from the Goit Island knavery, and ending the "recolant" representatives to screen themselves; others suspect it to be a Central Pacific trick to defeat any increased subsidy, unless Goit Island is secured.

SARGENT began to win. To-day in the House, after annulling the San Francisco agent of the associated press, he sought to again justify himself, saying he had favored the Goit Island proposition from general commercial considerations. He believed it important for San Francisco, whatever local speculators might think, that the harbor should be crowded with shipping, commerce and the city should grow great by commerce, manufacturing, and the legitimate means that build up great cities, instead of being a mere port of call on the Golden Gate.

Calish Pay is here, working hard. San Francisco has been deluged in failing to have an active party east, to inform the New York press, which is largely in the monopoly interest, through the manipulation of subordinates.

WESTERN DISPATCHES.

VALLEJO, 25.—Three men out sailing this p.m., when near north beach gardens, were captured. The men were in water over three hours before being rescued by a boat from the U. S. steamer Mohican.

SANTA CLARA, 25.—This evening the bus which runs to the depot was upset, occasioned by the horses being frightened at the cars. The driver and one passenger were badly bruised.

EUROPEAN.

PARIS, 27.—A number of Internationalists have been arrested at Lyons. In the chamber of deputies, to-day, a dispatch was read from Prince Minister LAZZI, at Naples, stating that only twelve persons thus far have been killed and twenty injured by the running lava. The villages San Sebastian and Manducione are almost entirely destroyed, but the people escaped. The lava is advancing toward the villages of Ponticelli, Gennepi, Sella, Gennepi, Ponticelli, Torre Del Greco and Resina. The inhabitants have fled, and have been provided with temporary shelter. The lava is moving more slowly, and the

explosions in the interior of the crater continue, but there has been no trembling of the earth to-day.

J. B. Brown, secretary Interpreter to the American legislation, died to-day suddenly of diseased heart.

MADRID.—Catalonia has been declared in a state of siege. The Carlists are concentrated in Navarre, Guipuzcoa, and Biscay. They hold no important point and generally keep in the mountains. The frontier is vigilantly guarded by French troops.

BERLIN.—The labor troubles continue. The master-builders and masons have joined the carpenters in the lock-out movement. Thousands of workmen are out of employment. They have united in an appeal to the public for support, and discountenance violence of any sort.

We have had a very dry, open winter, but it has been raining for the past week and the ground is well soaked.

The miners have been passing here all the time for the last month, going to the Colorado mines, and now they are returning, swearing they never would go so bad before in their lives. Some say there is a little gold there, but so fine and scarce it won't pay; I never yet saw gold enough come from there to make one dollar, and I advise all men that can make their board at home to stay there, rather than to try their luck on the Colorado.

We have had a visit from the Navajos. They seem friendly and want to trade for some money; they have splendid blankets of their own make to give for horses.

Fifteen miles in a northwesterly direction is a beautiful valley, called Upper Kanab, where Canaan Co-operative Stock Co. keeps a large dairy with about 300 cows. Twelve miles below and on the same run, is a nice grazing country, known as Johnson's ranch. We have not yet been here, but hope soon to have one run up the river, through these small settlements to Kanab.

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
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
