THE FUNDING BILL.

The House then proce eded to conelder the funding bill. Boutwell's substitute was rejected 66 to 22, and the bill finally passed. The first section fixes the lowest denomination of bonds at \$50; the second provides for only one class of bonds running 50 years, bearing 36 5-10 per cent. interest; the third provides that the income from bonds shall never be liable to taxation. The section legalizing gold contracts was stricken out. The sales of bonds are required to be made by advertising for

feet; from this the road keeps the south side of the river for about a mile and a half. But to reach the point where this cutting had to be commenced, it was necessary to construct a road from the month of the caffon on the south side

up to it. The road, which is simply used for wagons to pass up to the work, has been constructed by Bishop Sharp at considerable cost, for a distance of over three miles; and in one place it is taken from the river, large rocks being piled in with brush wood and heavy boulders, until a firm and substantial passage is obtained. On reaching the work at the head of this road, yesterday morning, where the cut is being made at Devil's Gate. found nearly 150 men at work within a quarter of a mile, under the charge of Bro. James Livingston, of the 20th Ward. The cut is 900 feet long, and st the deepest place it will be 60 feet on one side and 43 on the other. To get away the dirt as it is being dug out, side cuts

have been made, and the bed of the river forms a convenient resting place for that which cannot be used to better advantage. East of this, a very short distance, is

a mountain of sand, which rises 159 feet high. This has to be out away bodily 60 feet in.
