BRISK DEMANDS AT HIGH RATES

Been Marked With Good Business.

Advent of Bright Weather Has

ALL LINES MOVING WELL

Volume of Trading Exceeds That of Last Year and Collections Are Easier Than the Average.

In the business world this week, the advent of clear weather has brightened things up considerably. In the banking field, local bankers report very good times with deposits more than holding their own and a strong demand for money for use in countless enterprises. This makes rates stiff and the best of collateral is commandable. There seems to be a general expansion of business everywhere. An eastern banking mag-azine of recent date comments editori-ally on the world's gold supply

It is estimated that there is not $\xi_{6,-}$ 000,000,000 of actual gold in the pockets of mankind, although there are over ξ_{30} ,000,000,000 of national debts in the world. We know that in this country our reserve of gold is supposed to be one-fourth our bank deposits while, as a matter of fact, it averages less. If all the debts payable in gold should be demanded at once, every nation would go into bankruptcy. Gold has become a world-wide influ-ence and the securing of wealth has grown to be something more than the absorption of money. It stands more

absorption of money. It stands more as a factor in the development of nations than as a means for the securing of individual luxuries. That it may have had its effect upon prices is ad-missable, but its consumption has kept pace proportionately with its output and the demand has never been entirely wars and other disasters incurred through wars and other disasters, the use of the precious metal in the fine arts, reduces every year by many millions, the sup-ply available for monetary purposes.

HARDWARE.

The hardware trade reports a con-tinuance of the April improvement, which is expected to remain that way through the current month, while col-lections are improving. This is a decid-ed change for the better. A larger per-centage of customers are beginning to discount their bills, than formerly, when they as a general thing took the full time of 60 days. It is now payment in 10 days with 2 per cent off. Prices of raw materials are holding up steadily in 10 days with 2 per cent oft. Prices of raw materials are holding up steadily, and in some lines are advancing. There is a steady output of spring goods, including large lots of fishing tackle, ammunition, guns, sporting goods, stove piping, coal hods, etc.

LUMBER.

The lumber trade reports the sawmills in the northwest as successful in curtailing their output, and the ef-fect is perceptible in the wholesale marfect is perceptible in the wholesale mar-ket. In a short time, the effect will be noted also in the retail market. Condi-tions in this city are satisfactory, ex-cept that there is considerable complaint about the heavy expense occa-sloned by the hauls by team to the new additions being made to the city. These cut down profits, leaving small mar-gins. One concern reports having had to add six sets of horses to the teaming outfit it already possessed to handle the same volume of business as was done two years ago.
