SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 13 .- An Assogains only a brief respite. ciated Press dispatch from Tucson, A. L., says the extent of the destruction to the railroad is much greater than at first supposed. It extends at intervals from the Colorado River to the Dragoon Mountains east of Benson. One hill fifty feet high on the Dragoon grade is washed out eight miles and washed out in places between Benson and Tucson. It will take three weeks to repair it so the trains can pass over.
