WORK IS ORDERED STOPPED.

Bond Issue and Goshen Incidents Let Severely Alone at Last Night's Gathering of Aldermen.

The city council will assemble in a body at Third avenue, between Canyon road and A street, at 2 o'clock this afternoon for the purpose of investigating the vigorous protests registered against the sidewalk grades in that locality. At last evening's meeting of the council several protests were heard against the proposed arbitrary grado being enforced by the city engineering department, among them being Garry Van Schoonhoven who delivered a par-tially unintelligible but strenuous "kick' against what he termed the destruction of the value of the property for residence purposes. Following out a policy of establish-ing absolute grade which has cost the city many thousands of dollars for damages in the part, the engineering department has ordered the grade on the hill on Third avenue, between Canyon road and A street, cut down from the property line from 15 to 19½ feet, leaving the entrances to the homes on the hill high and dry. As one of the residents put it, they will need an elevator to get into their homes if the grade indicated is carried out by the city. against the sidewalk grades in that

Councilman Receal said the en-gineering department had decided to reduce the grade about four feet, which would help the situation some-

what, and referred to the success the city had met with in establishing the grade on Second avenue, a block south of the ground in question.

MARTIN IS INDIGNANT. Councilman Martin said he thought

the engineering department was mak-ing a radical mistake in attempting to make a thoroughfare on such a street Ing a radical mistake in altempting to make a thoroughfare on such a street as this, where there was a fail of 60 feet in the space of a quarter of a block. He thought it was an outrage to property owners anywhere to take 19 feet of ground from in front of their property and ruin its value for the sole purpose of maintaining an absolute grade regardless of topographical con-ditions. 'I think it is high time,'' said Mr. Martin, ''that this city change its system of street improvements along this line,'' and intimated that a little common sense and consideration for the rights of property owners would

the rights of property owners would be a good thing to mix in with the sci-entific part. The work on the street was ordered stopped until the council could investi-gate and see for itself just what the conditions are, and for that purpose the solons will meet on the hill at 2 clock today,
