

TELEGRAPHIC. FIGHT AT PHARSALA

The Turks Preparing an Attack From Two Sides.

GREENS MAY HAVE TO RETREAT.

Events That Europe Will Intervene—Notes on the Progress of the Conflict.

ATHENS, April 29, 11 p.m.—The correspondent of the Associated Press says that according to a dispatch from Pharsala, Gen. Emanouil's brigade has been engaged since 1 o'clock this afternoon in a fierce conflict with the Turkish army beyond Veliotino in the direction of Alivio. A battalion of Evans and a battery of artillery have been sent to reinforce the Greeks, whose positions appear to be favorable.

LONDON, April 29.—The Athens correspondent of the Standard says: The Turkish army or its advance guard has followed up the success before Larisa, and as it is about this evening (Thursday) began an attack in rear on the Greek positions at Pharsala.

Aspects of the prospects of the intervention of the powers are very confusing, with the news from the east of war is very indefinite. It appears that the English government is inclined to send an army to the Greek islands to attack the Greeks at Pharsala from the east and west. Already there are rumors that the European powers were equally cautious of supporting the Greeks.

The position of Constantinople by way of Vienna that Ottoman Passus is getting to Janits with 20,000 additional troops is not confirmed.

The Standard Constantinople correspondent says that Nachal Pasha's division is resting at Tyrnavos, awaiting reinforcements. One-half its strength has been picked hors de combat by the recent fighting, and it is reported that it will follow the remnants of the shattered Greek army toward Volos.

The division of Nombros Pasha is marching on Tricilia. Its march is expected to take two weeks. The Greek forces at Janits will remain on the defensive until they are reinforced or are ordered to co-operate with him in Thessaly.

Although there is no good reason why the division that includes the 20,000 men will distinguish itself, the Turkish staff is studying a plan of campaign to be followed in the event of Servian and Bulgarian aggression.

It is known that a large force of Turkish troops is being quietly gathered at Smyrna, with a view of landing in Crete to expel Col. Vasos.

ASSISTS FOR MEDICATION.

LONDON, April 29.—The correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says it is asserted at the Italian foreign office that Greece has privately addressed France, England, and Russia to consider options of invoking their mediation between her and Turkey.

BERLIN, April 29.—The Frankfort Zeitung publishes a dispatch from Constantinople saying that the Greek foreign minister having made a request to the Russian minister at Athens, the ambassador of Great Britain, France, and Russia at Constantinople have asked the Turkish government to grant Greece an audience.

THE SULTAN'S CONDITIONS.

LONDON, April 29.—All the talk now says that the Daily Mail's Berlin correspondent, is of the intention of the powers. Even Germany wishes to save Greece from the consequences of defeat, and it is said to Berlin officials that the powers will interfere in their own interests if Greece does not invite them.

According to a telegraph from Constantinople to the London Advertiser, the Sultan will accept the following conditions:

The withdrawal of the troops from Greece and the re-establishment of the frontier.

Greece to be excluded from all the anti-Serbian confederations, and to pay indemnity.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 29.—The advances which Turkey will derive from the war are so obviously discredit that the powers are agreed that Turkey should in any case be released from the obligations imposed upon her in regard to Crete and the

restitution of the frontier. It is also suggested and urged that Cape Punta, opposite Preveza, at the entrance of the Gulf of Arta, should be restored to the Greeks, and that Greece should be required to pay a big indemnity.

In military circles it is further urged that a Turkish squadron should be dispatched to Vlora to support Ethno-Macedonian forces and to assist the Greeks. The Turkish squadron has been sent to the Danube.

GREENS ENGAGED AT VELIOTINO.

LONDON, April 29.—A despatch to the Times from Vlora, dated Wednesday last, says: Yesterday the Turks tried to cut the railway to Veliotino. The Greeks fought bravely, losing three killed, one wounded, and one missing. The Greeks easily repulsed the attack.

Panayis mathous has without exception between recklessness and terror. There was no sign of any sense of control, as there is in military units, as there are no civil authorities. The telephone has been destroyed and the post master is absent at the post office.

LONDON, April 29.—A despatch to the Times from Vlora, dated Saturday, says: Greek soldiers are pouring into the town in an almost unbroken column, coming apparently from every point of the Turkish territory recently occupied by the Greeks.

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CHIOTS WANT TO HELP.

LONDON, April 29.—A despatch to the Times from Chios says: The admiral of the international fleet visited the insurgents at Alonrof and had a prolonged conference with the leaders.

Admiral Cuniberti informed them of the fall of Larisa and of the retreat of the Greek army. They were greatly moved, and were allowed to be allowed to go to Greece to fight King George.

The same day, the insurgents, their leader, who had been sent to the island they said was not intended to starve the island into submission. They assured the insurgents that they would be permitted to come into the town, and that they would be given arms and supplies.

GREEKS TAKING COURAGE.

ATHENS, April 29.—The courage of the Greek army is reviving. Crown Prince Constantine is visiting the various camps and inspiring confidence and hope.

General Mavromoustakos, late chief of the Greek staff, has left the Greek camp and is returning to Athens.

In the streets of Athens the Greeks have a battalion of cavalry, several batteries of artillery and a squadron of cavalry.
