CITY COUNCIL.—Meeting of the City Council, Tuesday evening, Oct. 19, 1878, Mayor Little presiding.

Mrs. Holly, by petition, asked if, if Ninth street were to be opened, he might be permitted to place his fence on the south side of said street, between First and Second East streets, about 20 feet north of the line of his lot, so as to include the old city wall and ditch in his enclosure. Granted.

The committee on streets and alleys, to whom was referred the petition of Harrison, Speery and others, in relation to a thoroughfare running east and west, in the southern portion of the city, reported that they had given the matter due consideration, and in view of the fact that the proposed road ran east and west, recommended that Sixth South Street be graded from the line of the Utah Southern railroad east as far as necessary requires, and that the street supervisor be instructed to grade said street as soon as practicable. Rejected.

The committee on streets and alleys, to whom was referred the petition of S. A. Woolley, and other residents of the Ninth Ward, requesting permission to work out their taxes on the streets and crossings of said ward, reported adversely thereto, but recommended that the commissioners have the privilege of paying a portion of their taxes in labor, under the supervisor's direction. Report adopted.

The same committee presented a report on the petition of Stephen Bailey, Marshal, to the effect that a platform on Second South street, in front of the City Marshal's office, was a nuisance.

They recommended the petition be granted, provided a railing be put up at each end of said platform, the work to be done under the City Marshal's direction, and to remanufacturing the pleasure of the Council. Report adopted.

The committee on streets and alleys, to whom was referred the petition of Joseph H. Smith, who desired permission to repair a portion of his residence, located on the corner of 11th and Main streets, in the Ninth Ward, and during the pleasure of the Council. Report adopted.

The committee on streets and alleys, to whom was referred the petition of Messrs. A bill was introduced for work on the South West Street canal, amounting to \$200. Adopted.

The council adjourned till next Tuesday evening at 9 o'clock.
