LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Women's Democratic club will meet tomorrow at 3 o'clock p. m. at the residence of Mrs. E. J. Roundy, 541 west First North.

There was a full dress reception early last evening at Fort Douglas, given at the quarters of the commanding officer to Gen. Baldwin.

Postoffice Inspector C. M. Perkins of Montana was in the city yesterday on the trail of William Herold, wanted at Stuart, Mont., on charge of robbing the mails.

George O. Ahlgren, Charles Anderson and Albert Anderson, all formerly of Sweden, but now residents of Sandy, have been admitted to citizenship by Judge Morse.

The governor-elect put in part of yesterday, conferring with the secretary of the state board of health as to the routine of board business and hygienic conditions obtaining over the state.

George H. Lee, a prominent manufacturer at Omaha, is in the city, and says that the telephone company there voluntarily reduced its rates from \$30 to \$20 in order to keep out competition.

Mrs. H. D. Styer, wife of Captain Styer of the Thirteenth infantry, commander of cadets at the Agricultural college, is visiting with the family of her father, Major Edmund Wilkes, in this city.

In the death of Michael Hennessey of Bullion Creek, the mining industry loses a persistent and able worker, and the mining industry of the southern part of the state in particular regret his demise.

The Twenty-ninth infantry hand men have been sitting for their picture. From the sudden jump in the number of clowns, it would appear that a school for the clowns has been started at Fort Douglas.

Local holders of Utah turkeys who feared they were stuck because so many of the birds were left over from Thanksgiving, are now shipping the same to mining camps in adjacent states, and thus getting rid of the surplus.

Private Frank L. Walsh of L. company, Twenty-ninth infantry, who recently deserted from his command at Fort Douglas, has been captured at Kansas City and returned to this post. He will be tried by general court-martial.

The Utah-Mexican Land and Sugar company will send experts to examine the 300,000 acre tract in Tabasco, Mex., on which the company holds an option, and W. J. Dooley, Anna Eldridge and J. C. Dick will make the pilgrimage in a few days.

Gen. Prisoner Joseph M. Thomas, serving a six months sentence at Fort Douglas on charge of stealing a can of corn, has been released and returned to duty, it being shown that accused did not steal the can but on the contrary bought it.

City Engineer George W. Snow returned yesterday from Muncie, Ind., and other eastern points, where he has been looking after his oil interests and at the same time investigating the water sources and supply of some of the larger eastern cities.

The Salt Lake County Medical society elected these officers last evening, at the Commercial club: President, Dr. J. M. Harrison; vice president, Dr. A. J. Hosmer; secretary and treasurer, Dr. E. D. Hammond. It was decided to have the annual banquet early in January.

The brass band of the Street Car Men's union will give a ball and concert next Thursday evening, in the Federation building hall. The boys have been practicing diligently for the last few weeks, and have got into very fine shape. The presence among them of a few old army musicians is having a wholesome effect.

President Kerr of the Agricultural college is in the city, today, and says that there are now in attendance at the college over 100 new students than there were one year ago at this time, and that the total attendance for the season will register over 750 students. He reports the institution in better shape than ever before, and in fine working order.

The gratifying information was given yesterday afternoon at the meeting of the Y. M. C. A. directors that the new building will cost about \$25,000 less than it could be duplicated for by paying the regular cost of the materials, and in nearly all the cases the materials were purchased at cost. The total cost of the structure is now figured at \$104,000.

Tom Pritch, once candidate for the United States Senate from Utah, and who found that the climate of Honolulu was more agreeable when he failed to carry a single vote in the Legislature, and subsequently removed to Lexington, Ida., has now fitted to San Bernardino, and proposes now to remove to New York and then somewhere else. WHO CAN VOTE.

Qualifications Necessary to Ballot for Water and Sewer Bond.

Today is the first registration day for those who are qualified to vote at the special election to be held on Jan. 2, 1905, for the voting of bonds in the sum of \$850,000 to increase the city's water supply and \$150,000 to extend the sewer system to the southern and western parts of town. The only day besides today on which voters may register for the election is Tuesday, Dec. 27. The same registrars act in this election as last and their offices are at the same locations unless otherwise noted. In his instructions sent out to the registrars City Recorder Orin C. Chisholm quotes from an opinion from City Atty. Gen. as to who are qualified to register and vote at the coming election. According to the opinion all persons who have paid or will have paid a property tax, either on real or personal property, for the year 1904 on the date of the election are entitled to vote on the issuance of the bonds. The instructions on that point follow:

"The only persons entitled to register on Dec. 13 and Dec. 27, 1904, are those qualified electors of Salt Lake City, not already registered who have paid a property tax in Salt Lake City for the year 1904, or who, on Jan. 2, 1905, shall have paid a property tax in said city for the year 1904. Persons who are qualified to vote at this election, and who are not taxpayers in said city, or who cannot take the oath that on Jan. 2, 1905, they will be qualified electors, and shall have paid a property tax in said city for the year 1904, are not entitled to register at this registration. By property tax is meant a tax on property, either real or personal. The payment of a poll tax only does not entitle a person to register or vote. A list of all persons registered both at the general registration and at the special registration should be certified to the judges.

LARGER SALARIES
FOR PRINCIPALS.

Board of Education Unanimously

Adopted a New Schedule of Payments.

DIPLOMA NOW VALUED AT \$5.

Each Teacher Under a Principal Will

Increase His Pay \$4.25 For Month.

The long discussed increase in the salaries of principals was finally adopted at a meeting of the board of education last night. The adoption of the schedule in open session went through without debate, owing to the fact that for two hours previous the board had discussed under the proposition.

Under the new provisions principals receive an increase of \$4.25 per month for each teacher under their supervision, and an increase of \$5 per month if they hold a state certificate, provided that no principal shall receive more than \$100 per month. Four principals of the city schools in charge of the Webster, Grant, Lowell and Ogden schools receive the maximum salary provided.

The following is the schedule as adopted, to be operative after Dec. 5: "That salaries of high school principals shall be determined on individual merit, but the minimum salary paid to a high school principal shall not be less than the maximum salary paid an elementary school principal. A high school principal shall, however, be the holder of a Utah state high school diploma, or its equivalent.

"Each principal of an elementary school (grammar or primary) shall receive a salary of \$80, with \$4.25 additional for each teacher under his direct supervision; provided, that \$150 shall be the maximum monthly salary paid any elementary school principal; provided, further, that no principal shall receive more than \$150 monthly salary. The committee of the whole brought in a resolution governing the fumigation of school rooms by the storekeeper at the request of principals. After lengthy discussion and amendment it was adopted, and provides that the storekeeper shall fumigate a school building whenever he is requested by the principal to do so, day or night.

A vacation starting two days before Christmas, and extending well along into January was adopted, the date beginning at Dec. 23, and ending at Jan. 9, 1905. With this resolution went another providing that teachers receive pay for Christmas and New Year's day which was unanimously adopted.

It was ordered that teachers' payrolls for December, amounting to \$25,495.46 be paid, and that the janitors receive pay Dec. 25 for the month of December. Miscellaneous bills amounting to \$64.42 were allowed. Two teachers were elected, Elsie Butts and Francis M. Tobin, at salaries of \$85 and \$70 per month respectively.

NOW ASSISTANT CHIEF.

Capt. W. C. Workman of the Fire Department is Promoted.

A deserving promotion was made in the fire department last night when Captain W. C. Workman, one of the most popular men in the fire fighting service, received the appointment from Chief Bywater of the office of assistant chief, to succeed Charles E. Wood, resigned. Had the latter been able to elect his successor, it is believed his choice would have been Capt. Workman.

When word came from the council last night that Capt. Workman had been appointed, and that the appointment was confirmed unanimously, there was much joy around headquarters, and Mr. Workman has since been almost overwhelmed with congratulations.

Since 1876 he has been in the fire fighting service. At that time he belonged to the volunteer firemen and later was one of the first four men to be paid by the city. This appointment came on Oct. 1, 1903. In April, '94, he was appointed captain of the chemical and served in that capacity until June 9, 1895, when he was appointed senior captain of the department, a position which he has held with signal credit on a disability ever since.

Capt. Workman understands thoroughly all the needs and workings of the fire department. He has assisted in its development from a volunteer organization to a modern, well equipped and well manned organization. The department and the city, as well as Mr. Workman, are to be congratulated for the appointment.

It is understood that Captain J. W. Love will succeed Mr. Workman as senior captain, he being next in line.
