of Washington, Baltimore, Philadel-phia, Boston, Chicago, New York and St. Louis, for scaled proposals from any telegraph company or companies, now or hereafter incorporated, for the transmission of correspondence by telnow or hereafter incorporated, for the transmission of correspondence by tel-egraph, according to the provisions of this act, and shall contract with the lowest responsible bidder or bidders to perform the whole or part of the tele-graphic service of said contract or con-tracts, to be entered into for ten years, terminable at the option of Congress. The contracting company shall have the right to contract for devices and material, not including the telegraph lines not owned by the persons of cor-porations, whether patented or not, as shall be deemed necessary for the establishment and operation of said lines. Two million dollars will be ap-propriated for the purposes of this act for the fiscal year ending Jane 30, 1885. The lines shall be under the direction of the Postmaster General and part of the Postofice Department. The bill has been submitted to the full commit-tee, and will be taken up for consider-ation in a few days.
