

INSTRUCTIONS.

For Guidance of Voters in Preparing Their Ballots.

(Twice for each precinct—directed to be put in each box and the other to be placed in the ballot box in preparation for voting.)

TO OBTAIN BALLOTS FOR VOTING.
Speak your name to the judge of election, who will, if your name appears on the official list of voters in the precinct, hand you one official ballot, provided that in the meantime your right to vote is not challenged.

TO PREPARE BALLOTS FOR VOTING.
On receiving your ballot from the official judge, immediately retire to one of the unoccupied compartments of the voting booth and prepare your ballot for voting by marking in ink in the "votable" square, of square, a cross (X) after the name of the candidate of your choice for each office to be filled. If you desire to vote a straight ticket put a cross (X) in the square opposite each of your party or party emblem. Before marking the booth fold your ticket in the outer envelope. It was folded when you received it, so that the only way to remove it is to the top without revealing the X marks you made on it. Keep your ballot as folded, and keep the judge at the table. Assume your name again and hand your ballot to the judge, who will, if the number of your ballot is identical, attach the stub and renumber your ticket to the upper right hand corner, into the same box and seal it. If you are not challenged your ballot will be permitted to be returned to you, and you will seal it. Put the ballot, with the printed endorsement thereon, against, in the box provided in full view of the judge.

TO OBTAIN NEW BALLOTS.
Should you spoil a ballot by accident or mistake in marking, you may obtain others successively, not exceeding three in all, upon returning to the election judge each spoiled one.

TO OBTAIN ASSISTANCE.
If you are unable to read or write the English language, or by reason of physical disability, cannot prepare your ballot without assistance, make out to each fact before the judge, who of whom will then render you assistance in the marking and preparation of your ballot for voting.

NEWS OF THE WEST.

From Utah papers reaching advertiser's copy in Los Angeles, Wyoming.

George Paine, a contractor employed at the City Hall, San Francisco, Cal., was recently killed Wednesday evening by a falling plank, which struck him on the side, dislocating his neck. He leaves a wife and one child.

Rev. J. M. Crawford, a Presbyterian clergyman of Indianapolis, Ind., who was visiting friends in Los Angeles, was killed Wednesday morning while making a purchase in a clothing store. Deceased was 60 years of age, and leaves a family in Indianapolis.

The steamer Danamir Wednesday night ran down in the Fraser river, B. C., a fishing boat, containing the fishermen, named Frank Spott and his father-in-law, Misses. The former was drowned, and was never seen again, but the latter escaped unhurt. The deceased leaves a wife and five children.

Robt. Hooper, Wyoming Miner, Ward has been received at Green River from the two men who left there a week to explore the canyon of the Green river. They had reached Blake, Utah, having traveled all night, in which distance there are 200 miles. Four canyons were passed through, the first being seventy miles, the second forty-five miles, the third ten miles and the fourth 112 miles in length. The men prospect for gold and used pay miners in many places. They will continue their journey down the Green river to its junction with the Colorado.

Edward G. Maxwell and Miss Emma Edwards were married by Justice Lawrence Wednesday evening at Oakland, Cal., and immediately after the ceremony the groom was arrested on a warrant issued by the same justice and sworn to by Miss Emma Edwards. Maxwell gave bonds for his appearance when wanted and departed with his bride. When Maxwell returned in court he may have to face a charge of elopement, for Miss Edwards claims to be his common law wife, the claim that she was wronged by Maxwell five years ago under promise that he would marry her. She was not 15 years of age and was employed as a clerk in a store on San Pablo avenue. She claims that Maxwell took her to live with him, and while he did not marry her he provided for her. She claims further that prior to the marriage if he was requiring the submission of marriage that he repeatedly introduced her as his wife. She said that she recently learned that he intended to desert her for another woman, and that when she begged him to marry her for the sake of her two children he refused. Maxwell is a man of means.

The trial of John Tatum upon a charge of robbery, which has been continuing the superior court of Madera county for the last three weeks, was postponed Wednesday night, the trial being brought in a verdict of "guilty as charged" to the information. Tatum was arrested last June and charged with robbing the single white woman from Raymond into Yosemite valley. When Tatum refused the charge he was indicted in a suit of murder and a man named Tom Bailey came. He secured the release of a man. The jury, which was sworn last night, will commence its work on the case. After the robbery Tatum instructed his lawyer to look a witness of opportunity of twenty miles and served him in the witness. On the trial he stated he was not guilty of the crime, which was committed by Tatum, his mother-in-law and wife. There were several other witnesses, and the jury will be sworn on the case but allow participation in the robbery if it is found that the same will be paid to any one. Tatum will be sentenced on Oct. 24th.
