Bell Telephone company has reelved many requests from time to time people in the outlying districts for telephonic connection, so he is plan-ning to place phones in districts outlying from telephone centers or along toll lines where 10 or more subscribers can be found within convenient distance from the line. The cost of the service will be from \$1.50 to \$2 per month.

T. E. Gibbon is in Washington. special to the Los Angeles Times says that Mr. Gibbon lunched with several members of the house rivers and hars committee and he gathered from what all these gentlemen said to him that the fight over San Pedro inner harbor has come to an end for all time and that hereafter Congress will regard this work as having been fairly entered by the United States, and there fore one to be completed.

A new street car regulation has be posted on the bulletin board at the barns of the company here. Hereafter the gates and chains on platforms are not to be opened for the entrance or exit of passengers. At the same time employes are notified that they must not lay violent hands on passengers. The car crews are now wondering how hey can restrain the man who wishes to make a flying connection and transer, and who, in order to accomplish this, insists in fracturing the first named rule.

Robt. F. Brighton, who came down from the head of Big Cottonwood Canyon the other day, says that the recent storms have made a wonderful change in the deposits of the snow in the mountains. Two months ago there was not more than two feet of snow on the level at Brighton; now there are six, and wind storms have banked the snow up solid into the gulches.
