### TOQUERVILLE.

WONDERS OF GRAND CANYON Will Soon be Accessible to Public-Trail Completed.

Toquerville, Washington Co., Aug. 31 -Francis W. Kirkham of Provo recent-ly visited the Grand Caryon of the Colo-

of the scenery. Through the energy of Preident E. D. Woolley, of Kanab, he says a trail from Camp Woolley to the Colorado river, a distance of 12 miles, has been completed. It is over 6,000 feet from the camp at the top to the river at the bottom. The trail drops 3,000 feet in less than three miles through strata of white sandstone, red sandstone and marble. The last four miles of the trail runs through the Black canyon,a narrow gorge of precip-itous, jagged granite walls, 1,000 to 2,000 feet high. A steel cable 500 feet long and a cage

to carry 10 passengers, are now within easy reach of the river. The cable will be anchored to huge granite boulders. Passengers will cross the river 50 feet

above the water. Within a month the cable will be stretched across the river and the great wonder of America will be within easy, access of her citizen.
