HEAVY DAMAGES FOR LIFE.

Jury Awards Mrs. Blackmar \$20,000 For Death of Husband.

Beaver City, Beaver County, July 2.—Eva G. Blackmar, as administratrix of her deceased husband, has just obtained a verdict in Judge Greenwood's court against the San Pedro Railway company for the sum of \$20,000. The deceased, Edwin R. Blackmar, was killed about a year ago on the defendant railway, about two miles south of Beaver, by the engine running off the track and ditching. His widow received the company for \$50,000, claiming that the accident was caused through the negligence of the company in not maintaining its grade in a safe condition.

Levi A. Smith, who was the fireman on the same engine, was also seriously hurt in the back, and a jury was impaneled in his case. After the evidence had been put in on behalf of the plaintiff, the parties got together and agreed that the jury should return a verdict for the plaintiff in the sum of \$20,000, and it was so done.

GO BETWEEN CONTEST.

Veterinary Surgeons Declare Horse Is Not a Gelling But a Stallion.

New York, July 3.—The protest made against the Gelling contest, which was held on Saturday, on the ground that it was improperly described as a gelling, took on a new phase yesterday when the veterinary surgeons appointed by the stewards of the Coney Island Jockey club, sheephead Jock meeting, reported that the statement in the protest were correct, and certified that Go Between is a stallion and not a gelding, as he has been described in entries throughout the four years of his racing career.

The report made it plain that for four years Go Between has raced in a capacity not properly his, and repeatedly has received an allowance in weight to which he was not entitled. The matter is held under advisement by the stewards who stated that they had no announcement to make beyond the report of the veterinarians. It is said, however, that they will hold a thorough investigation of the entire history of Go Between.
