FOREIGN.

London.—The Brazillian reports of affairs in Paraguay say the war is ended; their forces permanently occupy Asuncion. The inhabitants who fled by order of Lopez have returned. It is asserted that Lopez has abandoned the country and gone to Bolivia.

The Paraguayans say that Lopez' army, after the battle of Villeta and Augustura, retired in comparatively good order, and was still capable of formidable resistance. They say that a violent dissension has broken out among the g-nerals of the allied troops, and they base their hopes of retrieving Lopez' fortunes and preserving their independence on that fact.

Cadiz.—Active preparations are being made for the immediate embarkation of six thousand troops to Cuba under Escalate, with instructions to the Provisional Government.

Florence.—Diplomatic relations with Italy and Mexico will soon be restored.

Havana, 13.—Key West, 16.—Many Spaniards who oppose the policy of the Captain General to the members of the Cuban party, being alarmed, continue to fly from the Island. Five battalions of volunteers are organizing. The rebel forces at Villa Clara and Cienfuegos, over five thousand strong have divided into three parties and have destroyed the railway and telegraph. Many young men are leaving the city to join the rebels. In an engagement at San Christoval the government troops were defeated and compelled to retreat. The rebels hold the railroad at Sagua.

Advices from Santiago say that military operations have been suspended on account of rains.

The arrival of troops for the army of Valmazedra had baffled the plot of the Creoles, who intended to take the city by surprise. The excitement is increasing and an outbreak is imminent. The cholera is raging with increased violence.

Madrid, 17.—An attempt was made yesterday to assassinate Prim, but it failed; three arrests of suspected persons have been made.

London.—An address in reply to the Queen's speeches was agreed upon unanimously by both Houses. Disraeli regretted that the ratification of the Alabama convention could not be announced; he hoped, however, for its speedy consummation. Gladstone was assured that the negotiations would end in the same spirit they had commenced in, and that the results would be satisfactory to both countries.

Havana.—Dulce continues active measures to suppress the revolution. The permission to carry arms has been revoked, and all arms are ordered to be given up to the Government within four days.

Havana.—Dulce released a Cuban, arrested yesterday, on producing American naturalization papers.

Havana is practically in a state of siege. Dulce has been urged, formally to declare so, but he is disinclined. Cubans are applying daily for permission to take refuge in the United States flag ship, in case of trouble in the city. Admiral Hoff has consented to take Americans on board.

Key West.—A letter from Trinidad says, the Cubans have raised the standard of revolt everywhere and have destroyed the telegraph lines and stopped the mails.

Despatches from Neuviatas report that a band of insurgents are pillaging the plantations. The insurgents firmly hold their position in the vicinity of the town. The negroes are wandering about the country unrestrained.

Dulce's wife will soon leave for Spain. The Government has received news of a rising near Matangos, and a large number of rebels; the greatest alarm prevails.

Paris.—The report that Rex King, Ferdinand has consented to be a candidate for the Spanish throne, is premature. He still refuses to allow his name to be used in that connection. The majority of the Constituent Cortes are opposed to Montpensier, and there is little prospect of his success.

Montreal.—The Quebec Legislature has adjourned for the want of a quorum; a snow storm prevented the members from reaching the capital; the snow is about eight feet deep in the streets. One hundred and eighteen inches of snow have fallen this winter. Several lumber camps have ceased their operations owing to the difficulty of getting provisions into the woods.
