A. I found alium in Dooley’s “Patapo,” “Charm,” “Queen,” “Venus,” “Orion,” “Amazon,” “Lake Side,” “Twin Sisters,” “Sceptical,” “Eclipse,” “Sweet Lily,” “Mar-arch,” “One Spoon,” “Royal,” “Imperial,” “Charm,” “Economic,” “Excelsior,” “Charm,” “Gems,” and “Giant.”

Q. Now, these powders mentioned in your communication in the Scientific American, “Dooley’s,” “Standard,”

“Charm,”—Baking Powder manufactured by C. F. Anderson of Milwaukee, you stated you found burnt alium; if you will please state the respective powder that you have examined, was it potato or ammonia?

CHARLES F. CHANDLER, called on behalf of the plaintiff, being duly sworn, testified as follows:

Q. Dr. Chandler, will you reside in the City of

New York?
Q. Your business is that of a chemist?
A. Yes.
Q. You are and have been Professor of Chemistry in several colleges.
A. That's right.
Q. Please state how long that employment has been, and with what colleges you are now connected?
A. I am at present Professor of Chemistry in the Academic Department of Columbia College; the School of Mines, Columbia College; the New York College of Physicians and Surgeons; and the New York College of Pharmacy.
Q. You are President, also, of the Board of Health, are you not?
A. Yes.
Q. In your various employments, have you had frequent occasion to examine the question (the wholesomeness of food, and the beneficial or injurious effects of its ingredients)?
A. Yes.
Q. I will ask you in regard to the use of alum with soda, in a baking powder, whether or not you have observed any injurious constituents of alum here?
A. I have observed no injurious constituents here, after the nature of alum and bicarbonate of soda.
Q. Without using any acidity of chemical terms, what is your opinion about the use of alum in a baking powder, in combination with bicarbonate acid and soda?
A. It is not for raising bread—whether injurious or not; organic, and liable to produce indigestion, and the disorder of the individual making use of such powder.
