SERICULTURE.—INTERESTING NEWS FROM FRANCE.

Editor Deseret News:—In my firm belief that sericulture will perfectly succeed in Utah, and will sooner or later furnish to our people several rich articles of exportation, I wrote last September to the leading silk growers of France, in order to open the market of my native land to our domestic silk worm eggs. I purpose to state briefly, in this paper, the result of my first communication to obtain this desirable object. Three letters came lately to hand from my new foreign correspondents.

Mr. Nicod, jun., of Annonay, near Lyons, the great silk mart of the world, informs me that the Japanese silk worm eggs constitute almost the only healthy ones which are now imported into France. These eggs were sold last season at twenty francs (four dollars in gold) per card. Each card contains about twenty grammes of eggs. Consequently, they were worth one franc (twenty cents) per gramme. About twenty-five grammes make an English ounce. If I desire, he says, to send him fifty or sixty ounces of Utah silk worm eggs, with a sample of our cocoons for sale, they must reach him before the end of January. The value of each parcel ought to be fixed beforehand, but with the faculty of lowering it a little in case that he could not reach our set prices.

M. Emile, Count de Retz, formerly a celebrated silk culturist, now holding a high office "au Credit Foncier" (a large financial institution in Paris), has been much pleased with my first correspondence. Having communicated this letter to the "Central Agricultural Society of France," it has been pronounced worthy of being inserted in its general records (*Comptes Rendus*). Henceforth, all correspondence of mine on the silk business or on any other agricultural subject will be presented by him to this Parent Society. This nobleman informs me that, during the last twenty years, a new malady called "Pebrine," attacks the millers, the eggs and finally the worms. It desolates every cocoonery, destroying annually millions upon millions of these precious insects, and has compelled the European silk growers to export very extensively from Japan large quantities of fresh silkworm eggs. These eggs produce an inferior quality of silk. The magnificent French races of the *Cevennes Mountains* have entirely run out. But he will direct his best exertions in order that our silkworm eggs may be carefully and impartially tested, next spring, in his own cocooneries. This genial and influential gentleman will greatly contribute to open the French market to the trade of Utah.

Mr. Eugene Robert, owner of a most important institution in the South of France, well known under its name of "Experimental Cocoonery," and his bosom friend, Mr. Guerin Meneville, a world renowned professor of entomology, have jointly honored me with a speedy answer. They are both most distinguished writers. They kindly encourage me to persevere in my humble efforts to initiate the citizens of my adopted country into the mysteries of sericulture. These powerful co-laborers in the great silk cause foretell in the following words the future of this rich industry in our mountain home: "Utah, being the home of gold, and silk, if history is true, having been sold in former times for the same weight in gold, will certainly present some day the spectacle of the reunion of this two-fold auriferous product."

To conclude, I am informed by these gentlemen that the average prices of the domestic and foreign silkworm eggs in the French market ranged last season usually between 15 and 25 francs (three and five dollars in gold) per ounce of 25 grammes, according to the fame of the countries whence they came.

Silk-growers of Utah, I feel happy in presenting to you, the above interesting information. Whoever has silk-worm eggs for sale, is earnestly invited to send immediately by mail, to my address, a sample of his cocoons, and any remarks he may feel disposed to make.
