LOCAL BRIEFS.

The members of the Cannon ward will hold a reunion at the ward meeting house on Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Deputy T. R. Lewis has received new internal revenue stamps to the value of \$25.00 to be used next revenue year, which begins July 1.

A petition signed by 24 taxpayers will be presented to the Council tonight praying the rescue home be declared a nuisance and removed from its present location.

The Utah Presbytery will hold a meeting on Thursday at 9 a. m. for the object of ordaining the Rev. Mr. Carver, who is to be installed as pastor of the First Presbyterian church at Ogden.

The Humane society met last evening and discussed the case of a dog named "Buddy" who was overhauling a team in the hauling of rock. The matters will be investigated. Badges were distributed to members, and the society adjourned to meet on the first Monday evening in July.

A mass meeting will be held at the First M. E. church this evening, which will be addressed by Rev. O. W. Stewart of Chicago. His theme will be "Good Citizenship," and he will likely have a large and attentive audience, as he is a man familiar with the subject, and a lecturer of ability.

J. T. Brannen, who was released today from a term in the jail for perjury, was escorted into the arms of Deputy United States Marshal Smyth. Brannen was taken by Smyth on a bench warrant issued by Judge Marshall last January under an indictment returned by the grand jury at the December term of the court, charging Brannen with impersonating a United States revenue officer. The man is accused of collecting money from liquor dealers representing himself to be a deputy revenue collector.

PERISHED ON THE DESERT.

Attorney J. P. Walsh of Vernal Meets a Horrible Death from Thirst.

Got Lost on the Desert and Wandered About With Parched Tongue and Terrible Suffering.

[SPECIAL TO THE "NEWS"]

Vernal, June 5.—The body of Attorney J. P. Walsh has been found across the Green River, at a point about 30 miles south of Jensen, he apparently having died of thirst.

Mr. Walsh left Vernal ten days ago, to go to Mr. Gott's ranch on White River. He left with an old mule hitched to a cart, but had never been heard of since by his personal friends. The belief was general that he lost his way after crossing Green River and the Jensen ferry and had perished on the desert. This belief was later confirmed by Mr. James Hacking, who reports having seen the tracks of a cart among the sage brush and dead scale on the "Dead Man Flat." The tracks took no general direction, but wound about over the desert and through the brush.

While Mr. Hacking's curiosity was aroused he didn't think of any person being lost there, so didn't follow the trail up. That was nine days ago and there could be nothing surer than that Mr. Walsh perished of thirst on the desert. He had never reached the ferry for which he started. Mr. Gott himself came in last week and when asked about Mr. Walsh was surprised to learn that he had started on his intended visit, as he had never reached there, and he had never heard of him. Mr. Walsh had wandered either to the White River or Green River he would have been found by the Indians who camp there. But not a word had been heard about him since he crossed the ferry on Green River and the gravest apprehension was felt concerning him. As before said the general belief was that he perished miserably on the desert. The country was comparatively new to him and he could easily be confused and lost by taking the wrong trail, of which there are many, and once lost would wander aimlessly about until overpowered by thirst and which is excessive out there on the desert.

CONVOCATION CLOSES.

Puts Itself on Record as Favoring Any Measure Making Strict Divorce Law.

The Episcopal convocation terminated at the close of the yesterday afternoon's session.

At the morning session yesterday the committee on convocation rules made its final report. The report was adopted.

In making a report on the part of Bishop Leonard's address relating to marriage and divorce, Dean J. B. Eddie recommended that the convocation be held on record as heartily approving any measure which tend to the enactment of more stringent laws relating to marriage and divorce. The clergy and laity were urged to use their influence towards this end. The majority of the members were in favor of permitting divorced persons to re-marry.

The committee on Dean Halsey, through Rev. Ellis Bishop, submitted resolutions expressing sympathy for the unfortunate cleric who had been the subject of more stringent laws relating to marriage and divorce. The report of the committee was adopted during the growth of the institution during the year, and recommending that text books which give the correct history of the church, be used.

Rev. C. G. Huntington of Evanston, elected treasurer of the convocation, and C. H. Stevenson lay delegates to the annual missionary council of the

Protestant Episcopal church to be held at Louisville, Ky., in October next. John T. Shuman of Aspen, Colorado, was chosen member of the corporation of the Protestant Episcopal church in western Colorado for the ensuing four years. Dean J. B. Eddie was elected member of the Utah corporation in the place of Dean Halsey, and Rev. W. E. Malson and J. S. Lewis of Ogden, were chosen members of the Utah corporation for the ensuing three years.

At the afternoon session the committee on the state of the church reported finally. It showed an increase of 209 children in the Sunday schools. The journal was ordered printed, the convocation then adjourned after the singing of a hymn.

ORDINANCE VETOED.

Mayor Thompson Disapproves of the Measure Abolishing City Offices.

Mayor Thompson has vetoed the Beatty ordinance passed at last Tuesday evening's Council meeting abolishing the offices of sanitary and provision inspectors, and imposing the duties pertaining to those offices on the health commissioner. His honor holds that the ordinance confers on the Mayor the power to appoint all appointive officers and agents or employees, except that elective officers shall have the sole right to appoint their deputies and assistants, but with the consent of the Council. The veto will be presented to the Council tonight and acted upon. The probabilities are the ordinance will become a law, however, notwithstanding the objections of the Mayor thereon.
