### A BILL.

To guarantee to the people of the several Territories a republican form of gevernment, and to secure them in the right of local self-government.

Be it enacted, etc., That at the next general election for Dalegate to Cougress in each of the Territories of the United States, there shall be chosen by the qualified electors thereof, the following named territorial officers: One governor, one secretary, one chief justice and two associate justices of the supreme court, one superin-tendent of public instruction, and one commissioner of immigration, whose terms of office shall com-mence on the first day of January, eighteen hundred and seventynine, and continue until their successors are elected and qualified.

SECTION 1.—Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City: That any person in this city, First, Who either keeps a house of III-fame resorted to for the pur-pose of prostitution or lewdness; or wilfully resides in such house or resorts thereto for lewdness; or resorts thereto for lewdness;

AN ORDINANCE

Relating to Houses of Ill.

Fame and Prostitution.

Second, Who is the owner of any building or tenement, the whole or any part of which is used for any of the purposes mentioned in the first subdivision of this section; or has control of such building or tene. ment as agent, guardiau, or lesse of such owner, or as the agent of such guardian or lessee, and after notice of such improper use of such building or tenement shall fall to suppress the same by removing therefrom the occupants thereof

Third, Who lets any building or tenement knowing that the lesse intends using the same, or any part thereof, for any of the purposes mentioned in the first subdivision of this section; or harbors or keeps about his or her private premises any whoremaster, strumpet or whore, knowing the same to be guilty of following a lewd course of ife therein;

Shall be liable, for such offence, to a fine in any sum not exceeding ninety-nine dollars, or to imprison ment for any term not exceeding one hundred days; or to both suc ine and imprisonment.

SEC. 2 .- It shall be lawful, on the trial of any person charged with either of the offences named in the preceding section, for the prosecution to introduce in support of such charge, testimony of the general character and reputation of the person or place, touching the of fence or charge set forth in the complaint, and the defendant may likewise resort to testimony of like nature for the purpose of dis proving such charge.

SEC. 3 .- In prosecutions under the second subdivision of Section one of this ord nance it shall be a sufficient defense if the defendant shows at the trial that he has dillgently used the power which the law gives him to suppress the improper use of the building or tenement concerning which the charge is made.

SEC. 4.—That Chapter forty-four of the Revised Ordinances of Salt Lake City, passed July 20th, 1875, "Relating to Houses of Ill-tame and Prostitution," be, and thesame is hereby repealed; Provided, that all offences heretofore committed in violation of any of the provisions of said Chapter forty-four of the Revised Ordinances of Salt Lake City hereby repealed, may be enquired into, prosecuted and punished the same as if this ordinance had not been passed.
