

## PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS several persons in this city are afflicted with that loathsome disease, the small-pox, and some stringent regulations are necessary to prevent contagion;

NOW THEREFORE I, LESTER J. HERRICK, by virtue of the authority vested in me as the Mayor of Ogden City and by Resolution of the City Council, hereby require that a yellow flag be raised at each and every house in this city containing any person afflicted with small-pox;

That all persons knowing themselves to have been exposed to infection remain within their residences, and refrain from mingling with the public until all danger of their spreading of the contagion is past;

That all nuisances, such as filthy outhouses, cow and pig pens, etc., be abated, and that general sanitary regulations be enforced; I also recommend the vaccination of all persons who have not adopted that remedy, and the suppression of all undue excitement in relation to the malady, and that schools and public assemblies of every kind be discontinued until further notice.

W. N. Fife has been appointed Special Marshal, to see that the foregoing regulations are enforced, and to make arrangements for supplying the afflicted with necessities; that communication between the infected and the public may be cut off.

Small-Pox Spreading.

OGDEN CITY, Utah,  
Oct. 15, 1876.

Editor Deseret News:

This afternoon I saw our special marshal, Col. W. N. Fife, who has been detailed by the city council to attend to those of our citizens who are afflicted with small-pox, and to enforce the regulations of the council, which are embodied in a proclamation by the mayor of this city. He informs me that a number of new cases have developed themselves to-day, and that there are now thirty-two cases thus far which have come to his knowledge—one fatal. Mr. George Dinsdale, who was taken down a few days since with this disease in its worst form, died to-day. Mrs. John Crawford was taken down when it first broke out last week. This a.m. she was confined, but the child died immediately after it was born. Hopes are entertained that the mother will be saved. Col. Fife has been on the move ever since day-light this morning. He is energetic, persevering, fearless, and at the same time cautious. He has had much experience amongst this disease, and is exactly the right man in the right place. He will do his duty faithfully, and will enforce the city ordinances in this matter.

## Boreman's Folly.

In another column will be found the text of Judge Boreman's speech while passing sentence on John D. Lee. Boreman has been less bitter than usual for some time past. He has acted within the bounds of his office, and as if he had learned that it was not required of a District Judge to abuse the people among whom he was sent to administer the law, no matter how much he was opposed to their religious views and institutions.

But in passing sentence upon Lee he has uncorked the pent-up vials of his acrid bigotry and relieved himself a little. His business was merely to sentence Lee. But, being angry because he could not try men in authority in the "Mormon" Church, he took this occasion of convicting them so far as his unwarrantable language could do so. To us his harangue from the bench was an insult to the people of Utah, and an arraignment of unaccused persons, which renders him unfit for the position that he occupies. To the great public it will appear as a disgraceful act in a public officer, and to the District Attorney as an attack on his veracity.

When the prosecuting officer finds no case against persons whom rumor has accused but against whom the law has no ground for indictment, the Judge has no right

even to insinuate anything against them, much less to condemn them in language only suited to a pot-house debater on some current report. But then, what could be expected of Boreman, the last lingering remnant of the McKean ring, the fag end of the defunct Methodist-Christian crusade?—Ogden Junction, Oct. 11.
