

GOMER THOMAS QUITS SERVICE

State Coal Mine Inspector Tender
His Resignation to
Gov. Cutler.

OFFICE EXPENSE INADEQUATE

Blames Recent Legislature for "Trim-
ming" Allowances Too Close—
May Go to U. S.

There was no little surprise in ad-
ministration circles today, when Gomer
Thomas, state inspector of coal mines,
tendered his resignation to Gov. Cutler,
to take effect April 20. Mr. Thomas
reasons for tendering at this time are
set forth in a letter to the chief execu-
tive. In it he says that he is impelled
to take the step indicated, on account of
the meager allowance made by the re-
cent legislature for traveling and other
expenses connected with the office for
the next two years.

The sum was but \$500, whereas the
legislature of two years ago appropri-
ated \$1,000 for the same purpose, and
that was regarded as scant. To reduce
an amount already too small, Mr. Tho-
mas argues, makes it impossible to
remain in the office. He expressed his
regret at the laying down of his official
responsibilities at this time, and thank-
ed Gov. Cutler for the courtesies re-
ceived from him in the past. His salary
from the state is \$2,000.

It was stated this afternoon that Mr.
Thomas is to accept the superintend-
ency of one of the new coal mines to be
opened at or in the vicinity of Scofield,
probably one of the old Union Pacific
properties. When Mr. Williams, gen-
eral counsel for the Short Line, was
seen by a representative of the "News,"
relative to the matter, he said that as to
the superintendency he was not infor-
med; but that it was a fact that the old
Union Pacific coal mine that had lain
idle for a number of years, was to be
opened and worked. However, there
is so much news in that section of the
country at present, that it may be two
or three months before the mine is
opened on a commercial scale can be re-
sumed. The Rio Grande will haul the
output to the nearest Short Line point.
The mine was extinguished after a hard and
ruthless campaign.

ON COAL INDICTMENTS.

Judge Marshall Overrules Part of De-
murer—Charge Must Be Faced.

Judge Marshall of the federal court
rendered a decision on the demurer
interposed by the defendants in the
case of the United States against the
Union Pacific Railroad company, the
U. P. coal company, the Oregon Short
Line Railroad company, E. Bucking-
ham and J. M. Moore, wherein they
were charged with conspiracy against
trade by D. J. Sharp.

Indictments were found by the grand
jury last December charging con-
spiracy and restraint of trade against
the provisions of the interstate commerce
act. The defendants filed a demurer
against the indictments, the hearing of
which came before Judge Marshall to-
day. The Judge overruled the demur-
er on the count of conspiracy but sus-
tained the demurer on the count of be-
ing in violation of the interstate law,
on the ground that the law was vague
and insufficient, and he holds that the
company will yet have to face the
charge of conspiracy.
