

IVER LAWSON NOW KING OF PLUGGERS

Easily Defeats Samuelson and The Field in Australian Pursuit Race.

IS CHALLENGED BY SAMMY.

Provo Boy Thinks He Can Beat Lawson With a Start Half a Lap Away From Him.

Iver Lawson proved before packed bleachers at the Salt Palace last night that he is nothing if not versatile, and that all one has to do to keep the dust off his laurels, is to occasionally hand the crowd a surprise or two.

This season it has been all over at the track. It has been Lawson and others who have been doing the racing, and if any one thing is responsible for the big crowds down there it is Iver's terrific spirit. Last night he varied the program to show Samson that even in a pugnacious proposition he traves in the slow freight class.

Iver surprised everyone including himself, probably, by winning the Australian pursuit race. People thought it was a breed apart race for Sammy, and hardly took interest in watching it, expecting him to come in first and get his ticket punched. It proved not to be so, however, as Lawson easily showed he could plough past the victor. Eight men started from the gate, and Munro went out first. Then Palmer, Bargett, Hopper and Downing were lapped in the order named. This left Samson, with Fogar half a lap ahead of him, and Lawson near the rear wheel of Sammy.

Things looked interesting at once, as the people realized that the plunger from Provo, known always as the King of the Pursuit, had the best of the spirit game at his heels, and if Iver still had steam he could easily pass his man. After two laps the sprint was unwound, and plunger Samson was passed. It is now a question whether he will be pugnacious still. That left Fogar half a lap away, and Iver kept on his sprint, melting distance in a manner to take the crowd's breath away. Fogar faded quickly, and Iver was left to dash for him in his new role. McFarland failed to start in the race.

HANDICAP EVENT NO RACE.

Meat ticket races were the order last night. The half-mile handicaps arranged had the handicaps arranged purposefully to shut out the fast bunch and Lawson, McFarland and Fogar refused to start at the initial proposition presented. Theirs hands were crossed, and the referee, Mr. Achorn won from the 100-yard mark, finishing four seconds under the world's record time. Mitten slid over the tape, and received third place. Pymaking fourth and Agar second.

PROGRAM FOR TONIGHT.

This is the three race meet week. The holiday program for tonight was calculated to be the best of the season, although it can't always pass the test. Samson will go as feature, the easterly record as a feature, the time being 21 seconds. The idea is that he can't be beaten, so it is further assumed that he will be. It is providing that he doesn't take kindly to the public version of his case. The other events are a mile handicap, for a mile, and a mile lap race, professionals, quarter-mile open and a three-mile race for amateurs. The prize money is \$60 in the aggregate, which is one of the largest sums yet turned up at the saucers.

MITCHELL'S DEFENSE.

Mrs. Cressfield's Father Was the Star Witness for Him.

Seattle, Wash., July 2.—O. V. Hurt, father of Mrs. Maid Cressfield, mother of the 16-year-old girl, May, and husband of George Mitchell, was called witness for the defense in the trial of George Mitchell, charged with the killing of Frank Edmund Cressfield, the "Holy Roller" prophet, which continued this morning. Hurt occupied the witness stand during the entire forenoon and was cross-examined this afternoon.

It was a recital of the doings of the "Holy Roller" sect to George Mitchell, which is proposed by the defense to have caused the young man to suddenly become unbalanced, to reach into his coat where he believed himself to be the man selected by God to rid the world of Cressfield.

There were few interruptions by the attorneys for the state, but with these exceptions Hurt was allowed to tell the story of how his family was broken up, his wife and daughters led astray by the false prophet, and many other alarming occurrences incident to the reign of Cressfield in the town of Corvallis.

Only one other witness, Charles Schreier, a former employee of Mitchell, was placed on the stand. It was necessary for the witness to return to his home, and he was allowed five minutes just before the noon recess to testify as to Mitchell's good character.
