

ORTHOGRAPHY.

Editor Deseret News:

I have just read "Advance's" fourth letter on reform spelling and am much pleased with the array of evidence he adduces in favor of reform spelling, or rather, correct spelling, and while I with pleasure appreciate such evidence with the hope, yes, the belief that much, very much, more of the same and similar kind exists, among our own people as well as the world at large, I must, for the present at least, content myself to proceed with the exposition of my own views, as associated with what I conceive to be a correct system of orthography, and before I do so I must apologise for making a misstatement in my former letter, as to the number of new letters that would be required. Why I overlooked this in the way I did, I can scarcely say, but nine (9) would be precisely the number of new letters for the vowels, while the proper consonants themselves would require eight (8) new letters, making in all seventeen (17). But in a new and correct system of orthography, a few of the old letters would be useless; as used at present, they might still be retained, filling new and proper places. For instance, c is the same power as s and therefore u-less: g the same as j, and y, if looked at with the enlightened eye represents the very same power as w, while x is expressed by eks, that is, the e being represented by a letter representing the short sound of e, as ex, ed, etc.; also Q or q is represented by the letters kyu. Y should be called ye, in stead of y, as it is always called, through that nonsensical idea so characteristic of our whole present orthography.

But by sufficient examination it might be found that X should be used as what would be called an arbitrary character, as it so exactly speaks for itself in some words, as excuse, expense, express, etc., the same might be finally considered of Q, but perhaps not. Now after we have found or ascertained to a certainty the true fundamental principle on which a correct orthography would be built, yet, I have been able to see, by glancing along the subject, that a great deal would have to be sought out, tried, experimented upon, and finally decided upon as the result of the combinations of the best minds, on the subject, connected with facts as they should be found to exist in truth, and I have always felt as sure that these results could and would be as easily arrived at, if gone at in a proper way, as I was that I had found the real elements of a correct foundation, which was the result of investigation and deep thought.

I do not suppose (if there is I do not know it) that there is another person on earth having the same views on this subject as myself. I see in every platform on this subject some errors that I know to be so. I have therefore confined myself to very little bother with their systems, having plenty else to do. But in presenting an alphabet founded on my own views, I would of course find it convenient to point out these errors existing in the foundation of their systems.

But I have a system perfect and complete in its foundation which I am confident I am able to show. But I do not feel to present the elements thereof to the public without some assurance I might derive from references made by others' writing upon the subject by my views already expressed. For me to engage in any kind of advocacy of simply lopping off a few of the encumbering rubbish which now infests the tree of education, (as we might say) thus encouraging a system of toilome and inconvenient labor, which would perhaps require ages of time to bring the subject to anything like perfection, when we have it in our power to lay a foundation full and complete in all its parts, upon which to rear a super-structure perfect in itself, presenting itself in its native simplicity, requiring only to be seen to be comprehended, I say it would be a labor to me in which I could take no delight.

Therefore, unless I am led to believe, from what may be said of my views already expressed, that the latter course will be taken, if any, I will be under the necessity of retiring from the field at present.

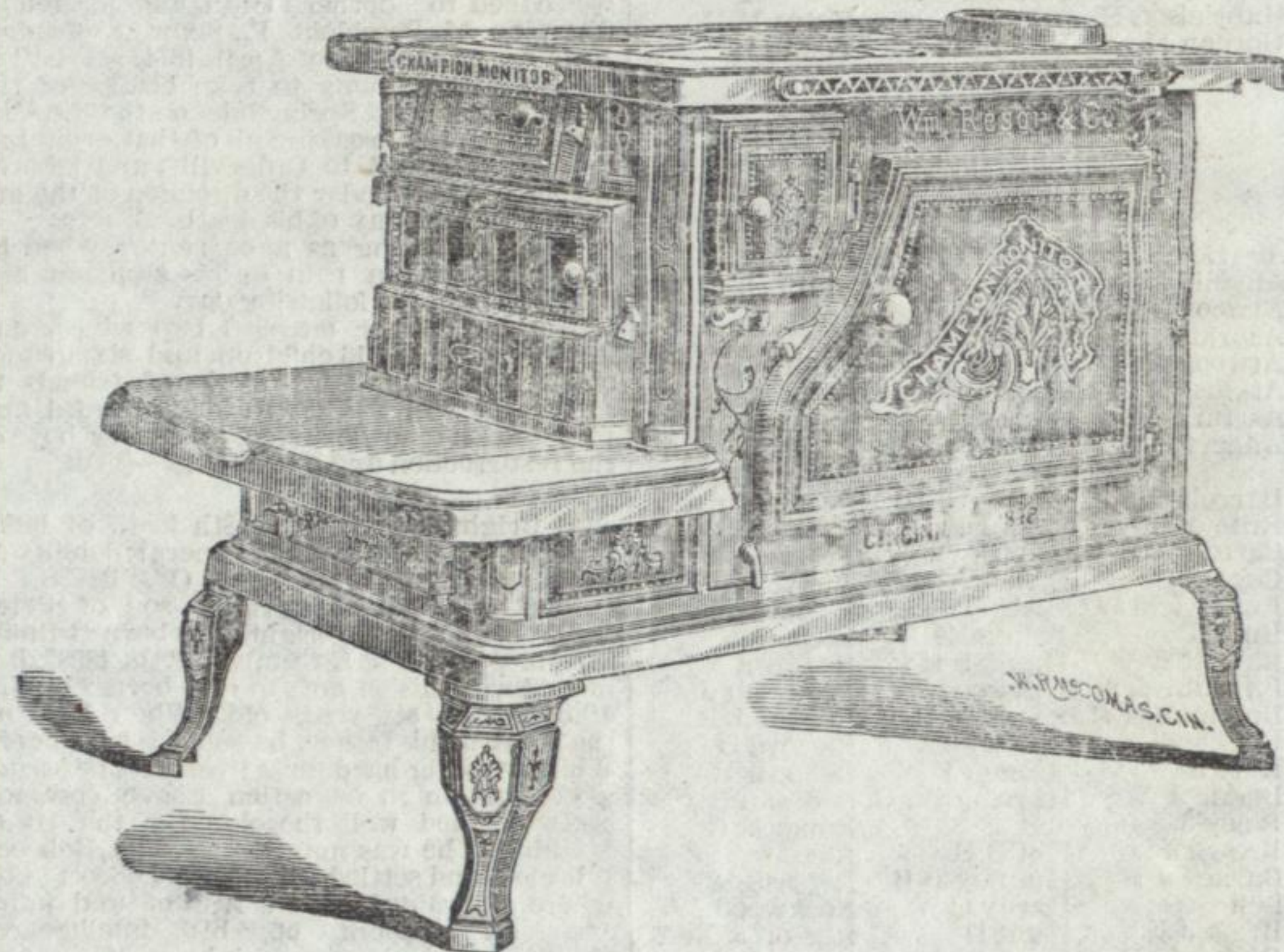
