MAYOR WINS THE INJUNCTION SUIT.

Judge Hall Holds That City Has No Right to Transfer Liquor Licenses.

Heath Petition Was Denied.

As a Result the Bar Near the State Fair Grounds Was Closed Up Tight Today.

The injunction suit brought by Heath Brothers against Mayor Morris and Chief of Police Lynch, was decided yesterday afternoon by Judge Hall in favor of defendant and it was ordered that the petition for a permanent injunction be denied and that the temporary restraining order issued on Wednesday afternoon by Judge Morris be set aside.

Acting under the decision of the court, the bar run by plaintiffs opposite the entrance to the fair grounds was ordered closed again by Mayor Morris and hence plaintiffs will be deprived of today's business. The parties to the action were ordered by Judge Morris to pay their respective costs.

The point at issue in the case was the right of the city council to transfer a liquor license from one locality to another in the city. Although Judge Hall gave no reasons for his decision, by denying the injunction, he has held that the council has no such authority.

Stole Jewelry.

Chief Robbery Traced to George Murphy, a Kenyon Porter.

Grand larceny is the charge on which George Murphy, second porter of the Kenyon, was arrested last evening. Jewelry valued at \$500 were stolen several days ago from a guest's room, and after working secretly for a period, the local detective force and hotel management succeeded in fixing upon Murphy as the guilty person.

He secured his board bill at the Blumore lodging house, where he had been living, with a gold bracelet, a day after the theft occurred, and the proprietor brought the jewelry over to Mr. Porter of the Kenyon, with a statement of how it was procured.

That led to a suspicion of Murphy, and after a day's hunt through Ogden and Salt Lake, he was finally located last evening about 6 o'clock in this city, by Chief Lynch and Capt. Burbridge.

Mr. Porter hopes to recover the rest of the stolen jewelry and has received a confession from the thief that he pawned another piece in a gambling house. Murphy denies his guilt, and claims he found the jewelry in the basement of the hotel.
