Vein Shown to Have Increased at Depth of 100 Feet.

A station is being cut in the West Morning Glory shaft at a depth of 100 feet. It was at first thought that the ore streak was only ten inches wide, but it is now said to be much wider, as, although it has been worked on for three days the extent has not been determined. A nice grade of copper ore is being extracted which runs from 7 to 22 per cent copper, with some silver and gold.

SUIT INSTITUTED TODAY.

R. G. Wilson Sues Trustees in the

New York Group. Suit was instituted today in Sammit county by R. G. Wilson against the trustees who bought the Richardson interest in the New York group under foreclosure on the 13th inst. It is re-presented that in 1893, A. B. Richardson as treasurer of the Park City school district deposited \$6,000 in the Park City district deposited 35,000 in the Park (hty bank which failed. To secure the school district Mr. Richardson made out a note for the amount psyable eighteen months later. To secure the note Mr. Richardson and wife gave a trust deed to Charles McFalls upon five acres of land and upon their interest in the New York error. Sematime area Mr. Me York group. Sometime ago Mr. Mc Fails foreclosed the trust deed upon the agricultural land and later, on February 12th of this year, he attempted a second foreclosure upon the mining property which was not included in the first first foreclosure. It is stated that Mr. Rich-ardson and wife deeded their interest in the group to R. G. Wilson before the first forcelosure. Mr. Wilson now con-tests the second foreclosure of the trust deed upon the ground that the trustee exhausted all his power and authority under the instrument when he made first foreclosure. Damages by reason of the slander of title is sought in the sum of \$5,000. It is alleged that the school board has entered into an agreement with third parties to lease and bond the property in case the board negatives a perfect title. The property was bought by Frank C. Davis one of the school trustees, for about \$9,000.
