

ANNUAL EXHIBIT OF UTAH ARTISTS

Showing Under State Institute
Auspices to be Held in
Ephraim.

INTEREST IN THE SOUTH.

Southern Cities of the State Keenly
Alive to Art and Dray Attention
Of State's Best Workers.

The marked interest in art matters characterizing southern Utah towns this year has resulted in the Utah Art Institute holding its 1907 exhibition southward this year.

Early this summer Springville led off in a state movement to obtain art galleries for schools, and started by establishing one in that town. Ephraim now comes to the fore by capturing the institute's exhibition. This is a state exhibition, provided for by an act of the legislature, and the prizes are from state funds; by no act of the legislature, while the boards of directors serve under state appointment.

Another society, the Society of Utah Artists, is an amateur organization, having among its members the principal artists now at work. Its exhibition is given independent of the state exhibit, although its members are the chief competitors for the state prize. Previous winning pictures of this prize are now on exhibition at the Chamber of Commerce. Secretary G. Wm. Browning has made the following announcement concerning the exhibition:

The Utah Art Institute announces that its ninth annual exhibition will be held at Ephraim commencing Dec. 16, 1907. The following are the prizes offered:

The state prize of \$300 for the best painting by a resident Utah artist, the painting, together with its frame, to become the property of the state.

Institute prize of \$50 for the best water-color painting, the painting, together with its frame, to become the property of the Utah Art Institute.

Twenty-five dollars for the best sculpture.

Ten dollars for the best drawing in black and white.

Ten dollars for the most artistic original design in lace, embroidery or needlework.

Fifteen dollars for the most artistic collection of photographs.

In addition to the above regular prizes, the public schools of Springville offer a special prize of \$150 for the best painting by any resident Utah artist, this painting, together with its frame, to become the property of the Springville public schools, and to be hung in the public gallery of said schools.

SALINA CUT-OFF STORY UP AGAIN

Rio Grande Officials Visit District And Inspect Line Thor- oughly.

PROJECT NOW MUCH LARGER

Connection of Sanpete With Main Line Below Salt Lake Mentioned In Reports.

CHARGES HOSPITAL NEGLECTED PATIENT

Banquo's ghost has been outdone. The Salina cut-off story is up again stronger and looking better than ever before. The southern part of the state is now confident that the line from Salina to Green River, Utah, is to be built by the Rio Grande and has a lot of good reasons in support of its belief. First of all a private car filled with Rio Grande officials was in Mantle Wednesday. The visitors inspected the roadbed through Salina canyon and after covering the Salina neighborhood thoroughly went on down to Marysville, G. A. Hornung, general agent of the Rio Grande, formerly in the same position with the Sanpete valley was the only official who would talk and he said very little but hinted a whole lot. "Manti and Sevier are not to imagine there's anything had in the air on account of this visit," was what he said.

ROUTE OF CUT-OFF.

Salt Lake is entertaining a belief as strong and confident now, as the southern officials that there is something in the air. To validate men in the recent purchase of the Sanpete Valley railroad by the Rio Grande means but one thing, the building of an extensive cut-off to eliminate that greatest of all great railroad nuisances, Soldier Summit.

The scheme as outlined by close followers of railroad affairs is as follows. The Rio Grande has but 20 miles of track over the mountains between Salt Lake and Green River 60 miles remain uncovered. This gap could be covered easily and without great cost as the grade is light and the line passes through a most promising territory.

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
