INSPECTORS WILL NOT GIVE UP YET Hog Ranch Investigation Is Next In Line After Slaughter Houses.

IS BEFORE COUNCIL TONIGHT

Meat Inspection Ordinance Will Probably be Passed at Special Session—Sewer Muddle Again.

After the council completes its investigation into the local slaughtering houses, it is possible that the inquiry will be extended to the hog ranches in the southern part of the city. Complaints of nuisance have been received which probably will be abated.

J. J. A. Turnbull, who lives at Twelfth and Second West, says that the stench from these places is so bad that people are unable to live within blocks of the pens. The hogs are also raised in filth, he says, and he will be asked to appear tonight before the council committee and ask for relief.

The slaughter house men will appear before the committee tonight and present their side of the controversy if they have any. It is stated that the supply of meat has fallen off considerably and many of the slaughtering companies are anxious to get a clean bill of health and have the matter closed. The meat ordinance had been drawn by the city attorney in conformity with the ordinances in Chicago and Kansas City. It provides that all meat slaughtered or offered for sale must bear the stamp of the government inspector. Although it will take considerable time to have the ordinance adopted, it is a large sum of money, the city council will insist that it be done at once or the licenses will be revoked.

There is a public health problem which is brought in from farms to be sold without bearing the government stamp. The ordinance provides that the man who killed the animal, however, will have to secure a certificate stating that the animal was in a good healthy condition when killed. The ordinance will be recommended tonight by the council committee and will probably be passed next Monday night.

The sewer muddle will be up again in the committee tonight. The contractors have been notified to get on with the work and complete it at once. No move has been made so far by the contractor and it is possible that the contract will be revoked and the city engineer authorized to complete it.
