RAIN FOLLOWS WIND.

Forecast is for Showers During Next Two or Three Days.

The weather has changed, the threatened showers are here, of the drizzly kind so far, with the rainy area extending all over the country, except a small section in the southeast. The wind blew strongly most of the night, ratblew strongly most of the night, rat-tling windows and doors and window shades so that people were asking one another this morning, "Did you sleep any last night, in all that wind? I couldn't." The outlook is for a continuance of this morning's weather, for the next two or three days, although at 1 p. m. today, the skies overhead cleared up, and the sun came out. Pocatello had 36 of an inch.

Then rainfall fast night, and Bolse, .50 of an inch. The barometer has fallen in all sec-tions since last report with lowest pres-sure over the north plateau and north Rocky mountain slope. Over the Atlan-tic states the barometric pressure is above the normai. These conditions have caused showers over portlons of Idaho, Montana, Washington, Oregon, and the British northwest territory, with heavy rainfall at Roseburg, 1.40 inch. Over the other portions of the country fair weather prevails. Moderate temperature is reported all over the country.
