

## SOME SAY HE HAS, OTHERS DISAGREE

Friends of Marshal Spry Declare  
He Has Not Tendered  
Resignation.

### LEAVE OF ABSENCE GRANTED

Such Is the Statement of Intimate  
Acquaintance—Others Deny  
This Is So.

Has United States Marshal Spry resigned? An intimate friend of the marshal this morning stated that he had not resigned, and that he was merely on a leave of absence from his office until Nov. 10. Another close friend of Mr. Spry asserted that he was not on a leave of absence, and that the probabilities were that he had forwarded his resignation to Washington. Neither personal friend wished his name to be quoted, but both were equally confident that the information given was correct. Meanwhile, Marshal Spry himself is in Stampede county, and consequently cannot be seen in regard to the matter.

Some color is lent to the statement that the marshal is on a leave of absence from the fact that another friend of Marshal Spry this morning said he had just received a personal letter from the marshal, and the fact that nothing was said in the letter concerning any alleged resignation was taken as evidence that he had not resigned. It was also represented that the rules governing United States officials do not state that they shall not take part in politics; the inhibition is to government employees participating in political campaigns being limited to civil service employees, and they being only forbidden to use their official influence for the influencing of any election, or in taking any active part in the management of any political campaign.

Then again, even a civil service employee is not prohibited from taking part in politics, or engaging in any other temporary occupation, in case he has secured from the government a leave of absence. Every clerk or official in the government service is entitled to 30 days' leave of absence if he wishes it; and it is claimed that Marshal Spry has been granted a leave of absence for 30 days, the leave beginning Oct. 10 and ending Nov. 10.

Of course, no official of the government is supposed to use his official authority to influence elections, or to attempt to influence the government employees under him for the benefit of any political party. But only those engaged in the "competitive classified service" are prohibited from taking an active part in the management of any political campaign, or from acting as a delegate for any political party. This does not prevent his taking part in any convention, or exercising the right of American citizenship or from voting, the intent being to prevent offensive partisanship on the part of government employees.

His sermons along these lines during the past month have been listened to with intense interest. He does not spare words in his discussion of existing evils and party considerations do not enter into his discourse.

### BOY STILL UNCONSCIOUS.

Chief Fitzgerald's Son Sustains Serious  
Injury While Riding Horse.

John Fitzgerald, the 18-year-old son of Asst. Chief Fitzgerald of the fire department, who was thrown from a horse at 9 o'clock last night near the corner of Third South and Fifth East streets, has not yet regained consciousness and it is feared by the attending physician, C. E. Benedict, that the boy has sustained internal injuries. The young man was badly cut around the mouth and eyes which necessitated a dozen or more stitches.

Young Fitzgerald was enjoying a ride with a companion and when he reached the corner of Third South and Fifth East streets, the animal suddenly shied and the rider was thrown to the pavement with terrific force. Passers-by hurried to the young man's assistance and he was taken to the emergency hospital at police headquarters where Dr. Benedict was summoned. Mrs. Fitzgerald was seriously ill at the time of the accident and the news was a great shock to her.

### RAIN FOLLOWS WIND.

Forecast is for Showers During Next  
Two or Three Days.

The weather has changed, the threatened showers are here, of the drizzly kind so far, with the rainy area extending all over the country, except a small section in the southeast. The wind blew strongly most of the night, rattling windows and doors and window shades so that people were asking one another this morning, "Did you sleep any last night in all that wind? I couldn't." The outlook is for a continuance of this morning's weather for the next two or three days, although at 1 p. m. today, the skies overhead cleared up, and the sun came out. Forecast—Rain, 30 of an inch rainfall last night, and Boise, 50 of an inch.

The barometer has fallen in all sections since last report with lowest pressure over the north plateau and north Rocky mountain slope. Over the Atlantic states the barometric pressure is above the normal. These conditions have caused showers over portions of Idaho, Montana, Washington, Oregon, and the British northwest territory, with heavy rainfall at Roseburg, 1.49 inch. Over the other portions of the meteorological report—Moderate temperature is reported all over the country.

Low pressure over this section will cause showers tonight and Friday, and cooler tonight, in this locality. Meteorological Report—Report at the local office, United States weather bureau, for 24 hours ending at 6 a. m., today:

## GOULD LINES TO MAKE BIG OUTLAY

Twelve Million Dollars for Enlarging  
Four Terminals to  
Be Spent.

### SALT LAKE IS THE CENTER

Half Way Between Denver and the  
Coast, the City Is Naturally the  
Best Location.

An expenditure of from \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000 is about to be made by the Denver & Rio Grande railway for enlarging its terminals in Denver, Pueblo, Grand Junction, Salida and Salt Lake City, and for the purchase of additional equipment. The company is making final plans to take care of the business which will result from the completion of the Western Pacific railway to San Francisco.

Detailed plans of the company will be made public in a short time. They include the spending of about \$5,000,000 in Denver alone. Additional freight houses will be built here; more switching facilities will be added, and it is probable that the shops of the company at Burnham will be enlarged.

The Gould companies will make Denver the gateway to the Pacific, says the Denver Post. The principal western yards of the company will be in this city. It is probable that the Missouri Pacific will extend its central branch from Lenora, Kan., to Denver, and Gould will have a short line to the Pacific coast.

More than \$4,000,000 will be expended for cars and engines. Recently the company received \$1,000,000 worth of steel freight cars, and 25 locomotives. The new order will be placed within a short while. Land for the expansion of terminals will be secured in Denver, and other heavy expenditures will have to be made.

For several years the Rio Grande management has been looking forward to an extension of its facilities, and some time ago tentative plans were prepared. Since then various details have been worked out, and the company is now prepared to put its plans in effect.

As the "News" has pointed out many times before this Salt Lake is to be the recipient of much attention, because this point is the connecting one of the Rio Grande and Western Pacific. This city is to have the big shops, which will meet the demands from both roads. Salt Lake is midway between Denver and San Francisco and is the geographical and business center of the western empire. The commencement of construction of the new half-million dollar depot in Salt Lake, the railroad history. Terminals which high officials say, will be as fine as anything in the country are to be erected here, and the Gould company and the shops to be built on the tract formerly known as the Church farm will be the biggest in the west. Salt Lake has every reason to expect to be satisfied with the outlook. Location makes a point a "gateway." Consult a map of the west, and you will find Salt Lake is located. The point will be easily seen.
