Special Correspondence, Stock Yards, Kansas City, Mo., March 5.—Cows gained 10 to 15 cents last week. Stockers and feeders closed the week 15 to 25 cents higher, but other classes of cattle closed up barely steady. The run today is 6.000 head, smallest Monday supply this year, and prices are up 10 to 15 cents on all kinds. Representation from the far west and the Panhandle country has been lightest of the winter for the past week. Some fed steers from Rocky Ford sold at 5.00 and 5.10 last week, some 550 pounds southwest stockers at 4.25, some Nevada stockers late in the week at 4.15 to 4.40, cows in this ship-ment at 3.75, canners at 3.10. Meal fed steers from the south sold up to 5.25 last week, and bulk of this class are selling at 4.25 to 4.75. Veal calves are 50 cents to 1.00 lower than two weeks ago, tops bring 5.50, account of large numbers of dairy calves being put on eastern markets. Cheap eggs and the Lenten season are curtailing the sales of dressed meals, but demand is still broad enough to require fairly liberal runs, as shown by the snappy manner in which the small supply today was disposed of. 
