Thinks Perry Heath Can be Made
Responsible for Irregularities
in Baltimore Postoffice

IN THE CASE OF JOHN W. PETIT

Mr. Heath States His Position and Says
It is a Matter of Public
Record.

ment made by Postmaster Warfield of Baltimore that former First Assistant Postmaster-General Heath was responsible for placing the name of John W. Petit on the rolls of the Baltimore office was discussed today at the meeting of the senate committee on postoffices and post roads. One of the members of the committee called attention to the publication of the statement, and suggested an inquiry concerning its correctness. Petit's name has been on the roll for six years and the government is now seeking to recover from Postmaster Warfield's bondsmen the amount thus paid, the claim being made that he never performed any duties in the Baltimore office.

Concerning the Petit case Mr. Heath stated to the Tribune, the organ over which he presides as manager, that several months ago he wrote a letter to the postmaster-general in reference to the employment of Mr. Petit, in which he said that there was nothing different from that to any other appointment he had made; that he had had no personal interest in the appointment, which was made upon the recommendation of some one in the regular manner, and that he understood Mr. Petit had been borne upon the roll of the Baltimore postoffice for two or three years after he (Mr. Heath) had left the postoffice department. Mr. Heath stated further that whatever he had said or done was a matter of written record in the department, and that such record, together with his letter to the postmaster-general, was accessible to the senate committee.

LIQUOR DEALERS INDICTED. Federal Grand Jury at Wichita Does Good Work.

Wichita, Kan., March 17.—The federal grand jury returned 16 indictments today. Six of them were against Kansas City and Kentucky wholesale liquor dealers, who are charged with violation of the prohibitory law. The method complained of is the shipping of liquor to fictitious persons and then allowing express agents to dispose of the packages to whoever wants them. The balance of the indictments against whom true bills were found were not made public.

True bills were found against Chauncey Dewey, C. P. Dewey, W. J. McBride and W. J. Ratcliffe for enclosing government land.

Kansas City, Mo., March 17.—Two months ago three Kansas City wholesale liquor dealers were indicted on a charge similar to that made at Wichita today.

REED EPISODE.
Mother of Boy Who Provoked Chastisement Gets Cold Comfort.

In response to Mrs. Reed's request for an investigation of the Jackson school episode in which her son Clarence was chastised by Principal Nelson, City Supt. of Schools Christensen today sent that lady a copy of the letters written by three of the teachers of the school who were witnesses of the whole affair. The letters were written by Miss Sylvia Cohn, Miss Barbara Heffer and Mr. Walter S. Hall, all of whom stated that Principal Nelson did nothing only what was necessary to defend himself from the attacks of the three boys and to maintain the discipline of the school. In the light of the statements of the three witnesses, Christensen stated in his communication that he felt that Mr. Nelson was justified in his actions. However he informed Mrs. Reed that she had a right to the board of education or to the courts.

GREEN IN EVIDENCE. Many Wearers of Ireland's Favorite Colors in this City Today.

There has been a great demand for green ribbons, and green insignia of various kinds today, and "the wearing of the green" is temporarily omnipresent. CARRIE SUES ARTHUR. Miss Hassard Brings Action Against A. F. Cummings for Unlawful Arrest.

The damage suit of Caroline N. A. Hassard against Arthur F. Cummings, former deputy sheriff, is on trial before a jury in Judge Morse's court today. The action was brought by plaintiff to recover \$1,500 damages for an alleged unlawful arrest made by defendant on July 18, 1902. Cummings, while attempting to recover some horses in the possession of plaintiff's father, arrested the girl for interfering with him. It was stated at the time that she drew a gun on the officer and for a time kept him from carrying out the purpose of his visit.

WHOOPIING COUGH. In View of Present Epidemic Board of Health Makes an Order.

The unusually large number of cases of whooping cough among the children of this city has made it necessary for the board of health to take more stringent action in regard to the quarantine regulations in order to check the disease. Hence the following order was issued today by the board, which explains itself:

In view of the present epidemic of whooping cough now prevalent in this city and the increasing number of cases being reported daily to the health office, it has been decided by the board of health to restrict all school children living in a family where this disease is known to exist, provided, however, that children not afflicted with the disease may be fumigated and moved to another residence and attend school morning the residence not under quarantine.

DOLES IN LUCK. Saloon Keeper Goes Free—Mrs. James O. Davis Released.

Alex Doles, a saloonman, who was arrested some time ago on the charge of making an assault with a deadly weapon on William Walker, played in great luck this morning as the complaint against him was dismissed. The complaining witness failed to put in an appearance, and the case could therefore not be prosecuted.

In Judge Diehl's court this morning, a complaint was filed against Mrs. James O. Davis, charging her with receiving stolen property. It is alleged that she received the four stolen from Anderson's store Tuesday night. She was released on her own recognizance, and her case will be called next Wednesday.

BOYS HELD. Four Youngsters Will be Tried for Burglary in District Court.

Rodney Husbands, Walter Edgar, Thos. Cosgrove and George Bates, the four boys who were arrested some time ago on the charge of burglarizing a store on the west side, were before Judge Diehl this morning for preliminary hearing. With the consent of the boys' parents, their hearings were waived and they were held to answer to the district court on the charge of burglary.

UTAH LAKE SCHEME. North Jordan Irrigation Company Accepts 50 Second Feet.

The stockholders of the North Jordan Irrigation company met at Taylorsville this morning and after hearing the report of the general committee on the Utah lake project, voted to accept the 50 second feet proposition. This makes two companies that have acted favorably in the matter. Tomorrow the stockholders of the East Jordan Irrigation company will hold a similar meeting at Sandy.
