

TALES OF ESCAPE FROM FOREST FIRE

A Teacher Tells of Flight of Himself and Children from the Blazing Woods.

NUMBER OF VICTIMS GROWS

Refugees Slowly Coming in but Many Will Never Return, Their Charred Remains Telling Their Fate.

Alpena, Mich., Oct. 18.—Out of the burned district are now coming some of the stories of suffering and dangers endured by those who survived the flames. Miss Cassie Howland had 26 little children in her school near Millersburg Friday afternoon. At the afternoon recess the air was smoky. Half an hour later the woods about the little schoolhouse were blazing fiercely. The children started for their homes, but were compelled to go to a neighboring house for shelter. Miss Howland says she could hardly face the wind during the walk of a quarter of a mile to her own home. After she reached it, the heat grew so intense that the women were compelled to seek shelter in the cellar, while the men fought to save the house.

"Then," says Miss Howland, "refugees who had escaped with their lives by lying in the plowed field with their arms buried in the sand began to arrive. They kept coming all through the night, all more or less burned in their flight through the woods. A boy named Rust, one of the family of children which on Saturday was reported burned, brought in the charred remains of his little sister in his pocket handkerchief. His father and mother had already arrived at our house. Their grief was terrible. When another of their children, a little girl, arrived, carrying a baby, the child's dress was completely burned off and her little body was a mass of blisters."

But one report of Henry Hines, came into Alpena today. Henry Hines, his wife and two children, are believed to have been cremated on their farm near Cathro. Between Metz and Rogers City seven more bodies have been found, making a total of 29 lives that are known to have been lost in Presque Isle and Alpena counties since Thursday night.

Rogers City has been saved. Thursday night, the village of Rogers City is also safe. The village of Posen has been in grave danger, but its chances to escape destruction are thought tonight to be better. Alpena is still surrounded by fire, but is in danger unless the wind shifts to the north. Between 500 and 1,000 men are constantly on the fire line working to protect the city. Up to noon today 14 dwelling houses and 46 barns have been reported destroyed in Alpena county alone. Added to this is the loss in this county of several thousand head of livestock, farm implements, boats and thousands of acres of valuable timber. The smoke here today was so thick that it was impossible to see across the street.

A relief committee today a general relief committee of 25 members was formed to take charge of relief measures. The Detroit & Mackinac railroad has practically turned over its entire surplus of food and clothing to the relief committee. In addition to carrying free of charge all supplies, every carpenter in the employ of the road has been rushed to the burned district to help build temporary shacks for the helpless people.

MORE VICTIMS

Millersburg, Mich., Oct. 18.—The charred remains of Mrs. Herman Erke, her three children, and two hired men, John Samp and Leo Busch, were brought to Rogers City today from Prentice Landing, about 12 miles east along the lake shore from Rogers City. Herman Erke, husband of the dead woman, and the two hired men, were employed in lumbering operations for E. M. Lewis of this place and lived in an isolated spot several miles from their nearest neighbor. The six victims were surrounded and killed by fire in the forest fires. Herman Erke and his eldest daughter were saved by being abetted from the camp at the time of the fire.

John Gresinsky, another employee at the Erke camp, said that when the flames broke upon them the older people caught up the children and ran for Lake Huron, about a mile away. Gresinsky said he did not know which child he carried, but that he saw his companions drop when a veritable puff of fire blew down on them and that somehow in his flight he dropped the child he was carrying. He finally fell exhausted in a cleared field. The dead children ranged in age from 2 to 12 years. The six victims were buried this afternoon.

Matthew Danowski, a 16-year-old boy, who came to town today with Posen, said that he believed his sister, Mrs. Estella Wojtaszek, and her seven children were cremated in their home. Neither he nor his people could get to the farm house in which the family was living. Neighbors of this family who succeeded in making their escape say that the mother and her little ones must have perished.

STOVE OVERHEATED, FOUR CHILDREN LOST THEIR LIVES

Altoona, Pa., Oct. 18.—An over-heated stove set fire to a dwelling house at Summit, a mining town 10 miles west of here, today, and four children lost their lives, while two other persons were probably fatally injured.

Mrs. Luke Delaney, mother of the Delaney children, jumped from second-story window, was taken to Johnstown hospital in dying condition. Wilson Judge, aged 10 years, leg broken; internal injuries.

Mrs. Delaney was aroused by the heat of the fire. When she opened her bedroom door, intending to rescue her children, who were asleep in another room, she was confronted by flames through which it was impossible to pass, leaving her no alternative but to jump to save her life.

Besides being injured in her fall she was severely burned. The children were burned to ashes in their cots.

OTIS H. WADE ARRESTED.

Lathie, charged with stealing and having in his possession vouchers and records of the quartermaster's department.

Wade was arrested at the residence of Erick Johnson, president and general manager of the Seattle machine works, after proposing to sell the documents to Mr. Johnson for \$2,000.

Wade secured his liberty on \$2,000 bonds last night.

HUMAN SKELETONS.

Found by Hunter in Canyon Near Point Loma, Cal.

San Diego, Cal., Oct. 18.—The bleached bones of two human skeletons on which were fragments of clothing were found by a hunter on Point Loma yesterday. The skeletons were found in a canyon some distance apart. By the side of one was a heavy revolver and a box of cartridges. No identification has yet been made, and it is very doubtful whether there will be. The bones are those of men and it is evident that they died months ago. The fragments of clothing found are too weather-worn to be of much service for identification.

SENATOR NEWLANDS SUFFERS A BREAKDOWN

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 18.—A special from Reno, Nev., says U. S. Senator Newlands has broken down after three weeks of severe campaigning and is on his way to this city to receive medical treatment. Senator Newlands has spoken in every town of any size in Nevada and was completely exhausted by the time he reached Reno last Saturday night.

SAN FRANCISCO SERVANTS.

Will Inaugurate Movement to Support Independence of Bosnia.

San Francisco, Oct. 18.—Servant residents of San Francisco and vicinity will this afternoon inaugurate a movement in support of the independence of Bosnia and Herzegovina, the provinces recently annexed by Austria. Resolutions already endorsed by the Servant club, denouncing Austria as a tyrannical oppressor, will be submitted for approval, and it is probable that there will be a call for volunteers to enlist in case of a war in the Balkans.

Women of the Servant colony have taken part in the movement, and matters have progressed to such an extent that Servant bands are being drilled in several coast cities by former officers of the Austrian and Montenegrin armies.

The council makes a new movement toward church extension and missionary work which shall accord closely with the needs of the people. The fifth department includes the states of Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Illinois and Wisconsin, and the council consists of the bishops and four clerical and lay representatives from each of the dioceses within these states.

COLLEGE ACTOR COLLAPSES.

Chicago, Oct. 18.—Earl Sterling, a member of the stock company at the College theater, collapsed during the performance yesterday.

Mr. Sterling's wife, who was in a critical condition all last week, died Saturday. Because of the fact that no understudy had been trained, Sterling was forced to act a comedy role at night and at matinees with his wife at death's door. Sterling played the part Friday night and then went to his wife. In his arms she breathed her last. Saturday afternoon he went through the performance and again at night without faltering or wavering, but the strain of the intense effort to keep his mind from thoughts of his wife was too great, and he broke down under it yesterday. The curtain was rung down and the comedian placed in the care of a physician.

PULPITS UTILIZED TO STOP SPREAD OF TYPHOID

Chicago, Oct. 18.—Pulpits of West Pullman were utilized yesterday by the clergy for the purpose of warning the mothers and fathers against the spread of typhoid fever in the community. With one or two exceptions the pastors of the various churches read the letter sent to 500 clergymen, doctors, druggists and citizens last week by Dr. W. A. Evans, commissioner of health, appealing for assistance in checking what threatens to be an epidemic of typhoid.

ATTEMPT TO MURDER PRIEST WHILE PRAYING

Chicago, Oct. 18.—An attempt to assassinate Rev. J. P. Flanagan, pastor of the Corpus Christi Roman Catholic church, was made this afternoon. After twice shooting at the priest in the Sunday school hallway of the church, the would-be assassin, knocking down a number of children standing in his way, ran into the street and escaped. The shooting and the screams of the children created wild excitement in one of Chicago's fashionable residence districts.

The man is described as being about 30 years old, roughly dressed, and evidently a Greek or an Italian.

Corpus Christi church is located at Forty-ninth street and Grand boulevard, and includes in its membership some of the wealthiest Roman Catholics in the city.

PLANKS FOR "AMERICAN" PLATFORM

The so-called "American" platforms contain a great deal of falsehood, nonsense, and deception. But the following "principles" are part of the program, though not formally inserted in the platform, and should be considered by all voters:

1. The Chairman of the "American" party mass state convention in the Salt Lake theater Monday evening, Sept. 28, declared a war of extermination to be waged against the Mormon Church officials in the fall campaign. "To carry the county and judicial district for the 'American' party and thus start the machinery of the courts in motion to accomplish THE IMPRISONMENT or EXILE of the band of twenty-six, this is the program of the 'Americans' as announced at the state convention."—Salt Lake Herald, Sept. 29.

A vote for the ticket supported by the Tribune is a vote for a program that includes the imprisonment and exile of every prominent Church leader. "Crucify! Crucify!" is the key note of the Tribune campaign.

2. Another declaration of principles involves the raising of the taxes on all farm property in the county. This was intimated in the Tribune during the bond campaign, as follows:

"Queer, it is not, that since the [smelter case] decision the farm lands have decreased in value for the purpose of taxation? In other words, the lands are not so valuable as they were, and farming upon smelter smoke was more productive from the dollar and cent standpoint of the farmer than the tilling of the soil. While there has been a large increase in the value of property for taxable purposes in Salt Lake City, there has been a decrease in the property outside, and the farm lands are not worth as much as they were a year ago. I SAY IT IS QUEER, but remember it is a fact."

A vote for the ticket supported by the Tribune means a vote for the increase in taxes, principally for the benefit of the politicians who are in it for "the spoils."

PEARL HARBOR.

Rear Admiral Hillyday Says Work Is Progressing Satisfactorily.

San Francisco, Oct. 18.—Rear Admiral R. C. Hillyday, chief of the bureau of docks and yards, has returned from a trip to Honolulu, where he spent three weeks investigating the proposed naval base at Pearl Harbor.

Admiral Hillyday estimated that it will require \$2,000,000 in addition to the \$3,500,000 already appropriated by Congress for the work. There are 5,000,000 cubic feet of coral and sand to be craggled out.

The work, he believed, will be finished by 1912.

Besides the permanent base at Pearl Harbor, it is the intention of the navy department, said Admiral Hillyday, to establish at Mare Island and Bremerton two large navy yards.

TO BUY DEL MONTE.

San Francisco, Oct. 18.—Negotiations are proceeding, it is said, for the sale of the Hotel Del Monte to a syndicate of English capitalists for a consideration of \$2,500,000 and \$3,000,000.

The deal as contemplated embraces the picturesque tourist resort and surroundings with two large ranches, comprising 14,000 acres of ground.

The prospective purchasers desire, it is said, to operate the hotel in connection with a chain of tourist establishments in Canada.
