We have had no rain here since June. No prospect of any at present. The mercury is still floating dent L. Snow confirmed all the abundance. The improved feeling among the nineties; although the early mornings and late evenings are a little cooler than they were, the days are still intensely hot. The land, in many places, is not only parched with fervent heat, but it is baked, and the people are nearly cooked.
