LOCAL BRIEFS.

"Utah As It Is" is now out and ready for delivery.

The Twenty-third quorum of Seventy will meet Monday night in the Seventh ward assembly rooms.

Peter Clark of Park City filed a petition in bankruptcy yesterday, with liabilities of \$1,245, and assets of \$600.

Col. Sam Park is improving after his operation at the Holy Cross hospital, and will soon be able to return home.

The board of education will open bids for school supplies next Monday noon, and contracts will be awarded to the lowest bidder.

Wm. Sunderland, the "rubber man" of Lehi, is in town interviewing a number of business men with a view to launching his rubber commodity on the commercial world.

The great capitals carved for the tops of the pillars at the Federal building required from a month to six weeks each for completion by the carvers, and a number are in position.

Maj. Caff, commanding Fort Douglas, has repaired the drive between the post and Popper, known as the Penrose drive, named after the late Gen. Penrose. It is in fine condition now.

The five special sanitary inspectors, one for each precinct, appointed and confirmed by the council on last Monday night, have assumed the duties of their office in the health department.

A deed has been filed in the county recorder's office by which Elizabeth Goldthorp transfers to Sarah G. Borge, for a consideration of \$5,000, lots 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, block 15, Elvencare plat C.

The colored Odd Fellows of this city will hold their annual meeting in St. Mark's schoolhouse on Sunday, May 8. The order will indulge in a street parade equipped with handsome regalia.

The special water committee appointed by the city council to study up the question of an increased local water supply, will meet this evening in the McCormick block offices of Atty. F. E. Richards.

D company of the High school cadets won the company drill yesterday afternoon on the school campus over companies A, B and C. The victorious company belongs to the east side division of the school.

The east Fourth South street residence of Mrs. H. W. Earl was robbed Thursday afternoon, while the family were away, of \$50 in money and a lady's gold watch. The police are in hot pursuit.

A 10x60 feet one-story structure for three stores will be erected on West Temple street, north of the Metropolitan hotel, for Judge Hallett of Denver, and the old adobe dwelling on the site will be torn down.

Local stenographers are called to meet in the Barnacle on Kendall square next Thursday evening, to organize a union for mutual improvement purposes. It is proposed to open club rooms as soon as possible.

Judge Hall has granted Laura Turner a divorce from Frank M. Turner on the grounds of desertion and failure to support. They were married on May 28, 1900, and have one child the custody of which was awarded to plaintiff.

Reports from Carbon county to the officers in this city of the Utah Power company, state that the idle strikers are gradually prospecting of their ever getting back to work. They are entering to other mining districts.

Alfred Haynes, janitor of the Hooper building, and Miss Sarah McKean were married by Deputy County Clerk David Smith yesterday at the city and county building. They had not met un-

til last Sunday, when they developed a fine, healthy case of love at first sight.

A raffle and benefit concert in aid of Mrs. David Nelson will be given at the Woodmen's hall, 11 West First South street, on Thursday next, April 14. The program will include instrumental music by the McClure Bros' quartet; Nelson quartet; song, Mrs. Thomas Hall; song, Millie Williams; and a recitation.

The sanitary condition of the houses and yards on east South Temple street are reported in better condition this spring than at any time in the past. There are still 31 houses on the street not yet connected with the sewers, and 30 days' notice will be given them in which to comply with the law.

C. O. Pratt, national organizer of the Amalgamated Association of Street & Electric Railway Employees of America, is in town with a view to organizing a union among the streetcar men in this city. He claims to find a ready response to his appeal, and the 140 applications for membership have been received.

A Linton of Kansas City, accompanied by his wife, arrived in Salt Lake last night. He will probably not soon forget his arrival here, as it is marked by the robbery of the sum of \$50. He says the money was stolen on a Rio Grande Western train. As soon as he discovered the theft he reported the matter to the police.

Suit for divorce has been filed in the district court by Elizabeth Hunter against Joseph Hunter on the grounds of failure to support and habitual intemperance. They were married at Scotland, O., Nov. 26, 1892, and have one child of which plaintiff asks the custody. Mrs. Hunter also asks that her maiden name, Elizabeth A. Hardee, be restored to her.

Mayor Morris has called a meeting of the special water committee of the city council, appointed by President Havellett last Monday night, to be held tonight in the office of Richards & Varian. The object of the meeting is to discuss informally the question of obtaining a larger water supply for the city and protecting its rights in the Utah lake project.

The next monthly meeting of the Benefit association of the Nauvoo Legion will be held Monday evening, April 11, at 7:30 o'clock, in the Bishop's office, Third ward. An address of the interesting lecture given at the last meeting by Wm. Sanders on the life of Joseph Smith, the Prophet, will be given by Mrs. E. Roundy. All members of the association are cordially invited.

Students, patrons and friends of the Salt Lake High school were given a rare treat last evening at Unity hall. The German department of the institution rendered a German comedy in a truly enjoyable manner. Two songs were sung by the junior class girls' quartet, after which all joined in a dance. The evening was pleasant throughout and regarded by the students as one of the events of the year.

Emma Carroll has filed suit for divorce in the district court against William J. Carroll on the grounds of cruelty, non-support and habitual intemperance. They were married in this city on March 24, 1891, and have four children of whom plaintiff asks the custody. The grounds of cruelty are pleaded in that defendant, on Feb. 15, 1904, struck plaintiff in the face and severely bruised her.

There is not much doing at present in contracting circles but livelier times are prophesied later on. Steel is now being placed for the roof at the Catholic cathedral, and as soon as the last tower is in place higher work will begin on the companion tower.
