MODESTY OF THIRD VICTIM When Relating His Experience to the Police He Declines to Reveal His Name or Hailing Place. Three robberies and hold-ups by negresses, who are now forming one of the most vicious elements of lurking danger in Salt Lake, were reported to the police last night, the most daring of which was the robbing of C. W. Dyer, a cattleman of Chicago, of \$165. This held-up, participated in by three colored women, occurred about midnight near Second South and Second West streets. Of the \$165 taken from Dyer, \$90 was later found scattered about the sidewalk, where it had been thrown by the women in the scuffle and their flight. The three women identified as those who attacked Dyer and who gave their names as Edna Forrest, Esther Neill and Jessie Mack, were also later taken into custody by the officers, and a partial admission of guilt secured from them. Mr. Dyer had been passing near the corner of Second South and Second West streets, and approached the For-rest woman in response to her beckon-ing. When he seesponse her beckoning. When he reached her side, he said, she attempted to dive her hand into his pocket, and when he resisted she began to scream. The two other women rushed up, and in the scuffle, they managed to secure his wallet. A: they ran away in scattering directions, he followed the Forrest woman for sev-eral blocks, and then giving up the chase reported the affair to the police. Lieut. Shannon, Detective Howell and Sergeant Roberts went to the scene of the hold-up and found the loose mone, lying along the edge of the sidewalk At the same time they came upon the women loitering in the neighborhood, presumably having returned to gather up their spoils. Thomas Nelson of Descret reported to the police that he had been robbed of \$28, while attempting to secure a room in Franklin avenue, and a third man, who did not give his name, in-formed the officers that after talking with a negress on east Second South street, he discovered that he had been 'touched" for \$46.
