TAFT PARTY HONORED.
Large Spectacular Parade Was Held Today in Manila.

Manila, Aug. 7.—A large spectacular parade was held this morning in honor of the visit of Secy. of War Taft and party. Ten thousand men were in line, including military, marines, sailors, in Australia and 30 provincial delegations. The parade was three hours passing the reviewing stand. There were 50 floats and 80 bands in line.

Secy. Taft, Gov. Gen. Wright, Maj. Gen. Corbin, Rear Admiral Train and Miss Alice Roosevelt and the resident foreign representatives were in the reviewing stand. Two floats bore fountains of yellow, orange, and other flowers were profusely decorated with flowers.

At one stage of the procession a halt was made and Miss Roosevelt was presented with a gold plate amidst unbounded enthusiasm.

At 3 o'clock this afternoon Secy. Taft and party received a committee of sugar planters who spoke of the sugar interests of the islands.

At 8 o'clock tonight Gov. Gen. Wright held a public reception at Malacanang palace.

Gov. Wright issued a special invitation to the Russian Enquist and staff of the interned Russian squadron, to attend the reception at the Standard Hotel and Miss Roosevelt, and the invitation was accepted.

"KOSHER" BAKERS STRIKE.
Police Anticipate Some Trouble Among New York Jews.

New York, Aug. 7.—With thousands of Hebrews out of bread on the East Side, owing to a strike of "kosher" journeyman bakers, much trouble is expected by the police in the district affected. The strikers held a meeting last night and said that they were determined to remain out of employment until a 10-hour work day is granted. They say they are 1,800 strong and that the bosses cannot go on without them. The bosses, however, say they will soon have enough non-union bakers if they can depend on police protection.

The strikers last night appointed a committee to wait on Acting Mayor Fornes today. They say the police on Saturday night had clubbed many of their number. The police say the strike is hard to handle, as the people sympathize with the strikers, and assaults on non-union men are numerous.

Run Down on Sidewalk.
New York, Aug. 7.—Anthony Reiff, a composer, 70 years old, was run down and fatally hurt last night by an automobile which careened upon the sidewalk as it turned a corner. The chauffeur was chased some distance by a messenger boy mounted upon a bicycle. He was caught on entering the garage.

Scores of persons who had seen the accident rushed to where the old composer lay unconscious. The automobilist was arrested, but no one appeared to make complaint and he was set at liberty.

CAR HELD UP.
Amateur Highwaymen in Portland Secure Cash from Crew.

Portland, Ore., Aug. 7.—A car of the Pine street line was held up last night by two masked men at Eighteenth street and Conductor S. B. Campbell robbed of \$63, only \$3 of which was company money. No passengers were on the car and the work was evidently that of amateurs, as the motorman, W. J. Ryan, had quite a sum on his person, which was overlooked through the nervousness of the robber searching him. The police have no clue.

Pellegrini Enthusiastic.
New York, Aug. 7.—Dr. Carlos Pellegrini, former president, returned Sunday from Europe and the United States, says a Herald dispatch from Buenos Aires. He was escorted home from the lock by a great crowd, whom he addressed. He spoke enthusiastically about the United States and expressed himself as grateful for the reception he met from President Roosevelt and others.

Convicts on Sakhalin Isle.
Tokio, Aug. 7.—The disposition of the convicts on Sakhalin island is now under consideration. They will probably be taken to the Russian coast and will there be transferred to the Russian authorities.

Scientific Congress.
New York, Aug. 7.—The Latin-American Scientific congress was inaugurated Sunday with the attendance of the president, says a Herald dispatch from Rio de Janeiro. Members of the president's cabinet and many prominent Latin-Americans also were present.

New Japanese Destroyer.
Tokio, Aug. 7.—The torpedoed destroyer Xuyoi was successfully launched at Yokosuka today. Her dimensions and armament are similar to the class of destroyers now in course of construction at the navy yards of Japan.
