A Ghastly Discovery in the Platte River Creates a Sensation.

INTERESTING ABDUCTION STORY.

Singular Marine Hoaxer—Five Children Included in an Elopement.

It is feared the wound will result serious.

Mail-carriers from Fresno, Cal., representing about 40,000,000 pounds of the morning raisin crop, met with the shipping and Commercial Merchants' association of Fresno on Monday morning to discuss freight and prices and form an exchange which would regulate the marketing of the raisins and insure fair prices. In the evening a committee was appointed to prepare a statement of what the raisin men wanted from the railroad, and a similar committee invited the representatives of several different lines, but especially of the Southern Pacific, to be on hand.

The Mexico office of the Southern Pacific at Fernando, twenty-one miles north of Los Angeles, Cal., was robbed on Monday evening. About 11 o'clock the night operator at the station was surprised in his office by a Mexican, who had his face partly concealed by a handkerchief, and said emphatically in his request, hold a revolver under the operator's nose. The Mexican wanted money and the agent gave up what he had in his pocket, amounting to about \$7. The robber then searched the premises and found about \$10 in the change drawer. The young man did not know the combination of the safe and was therefore unable to hand over to the highwayman his contents.

News reached Albuquerque, N. M., on Tuesday afternoon of a conflict between cowboys and Mexican sheepherders on the St. Augustine plains in Moore county. Three unknown cowboys rode up to several sheepherders and began abusing and killing them with their quirts. Encarnacion Luskio, one of the men abused, offered resistance and struck one of the cowboys when the latter commenced shooting, one shot taking effect in the lower part of his body. The cowboys then rode off and the companion of the wounded man took him to a corral, where he died the next day. For the past few years there has been bad blood between these men and it is feared that the present killing will result in more bloodshed.

Alvin Young, a farmer living near Brigham, Colo., made a ghastly discovery in the Platte river, nine miles from Denver, early on Tuesday morning. While walking along the bank with some boys he came across the dead body of a small boy. Little more than the bones were left and they presented a horrible appearance. Clinging to the remains were a pair of dirty, blue trousers, a white blouse and a pair of homestead stockings. From appearances the body must have been exposed on the shore for at least three months. On June 20th the three-year-old son of John Dancy of Colorado fell into the Platte river near the bridge, and although the river was sluggish it several miles the body was not recovered. This is the only case of the kind which the authorities know anything about and they believe that the body found must be Mr. Dancy's son.

William Maxwell, a farmer from Beavert, Mo., arrived in Denver on Tuesday in search of the wife and five children, who left their home on April 4 with Charlie Greiser of Beavert, Mo. Maxwell has been on that trail ever since and he is quite sure that the big slinking party are somewhere in Colorado. He requested the aid of Lieutenant Davidson in finding them. Maxwell is a German of 45 years of age, who states his wife is Ellen Dancy, younger and is said to be a good looking young woman. He says that his wife had no reason to leave him, and that he had a fine farm, with twelve pigs and four calves. He does not care to be much about recovering her, but he wants his five children and the three white beds which she carried away. The slinking party are said to be in the vicinity of a few miles in Kansas. Maxwell said the youngest child there with Mrs. Maxwell's sister. The police had no trace of the runaway party in Denver.
