## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**McConaughy Recovers Health.**—T. F. McConaughy has just recovered from a six weeks' siege with typhoid pneumonia.

**Recommend Sewer System.**—The state board of health has formally issued a recommendation that a sewerage system be inaugurated in the business district of Logan.

**Annual Meeting.**—The annual meeting of the Alumni Association of the University of Utah will hold its annual meeting in the Odeon on the evening of Wednesday, June 3.

**Sugar Ward Chapel Ready.**—The Sugar House ward meetinghouse remodeling has been completed. It will now seat 600 people, and has been made thoroughly modern.

**Auditor Alf Returns.**—City Auditor Rudolf Alf has returned from California, where he has spent the last three weeks on pleasure trip. Mr. Alf accompanied the cadets to San Francisco.

**Mrs. White's Lectures.**—Mrs. Marian A. White, a member of the National Geological society, is in town to lecture on "The Wonderland of Irrigation" in the interest of Twin Falls, Ida.

**Choir Has New Position.**—The interior of the Twenty-eighth ward meetinghouse has been redecorated so that the choir is now placed in the front of the auditorium. There are 50 singers now in the choir.

## BIG BONDHOUSERS LOOK OVER LINES

Gould Projects and Pressing Necessities Being Brought To Their Attention.

### MERGER VIEWED AS PROBABLE

Rio Grande Systems, While Operated By One Set of Officials, Await Formal Consolidation.

W. S. Martin, assistant general manager of the Denver & Rio Grande, is today showing Edgar L. Marston of Blair & Co. of New York, Alfred Blinzig, a banker of Berlin, and Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Dunneavy, over the Western Pacific. These visitors are heavy holders of Gould bonds and, as was explained yesterday, are being shown the Gould systems. What changes are needed will be explained and the conditions understood by the leading investors, the placing of bonds will be an easy matter. Blair & Co., underwriter of the \$500,000 bond issue of the Western Pacific and this concern is requesting its members to agree to an extension of the underwriting syndicate.

Big things are shaping up in the Gould system of railroads. It is believed that with the Western Pacific completed, the Denver & Rio Grande and Rio Grande Western will be merged into one line with one title. Gould owns both D. & R. G. and R. G. W. now, and one set of managers controls the affairs of both, but the two lines have never been formally merged. It is understood this action is to be taken soon. The Rio Grande Western, with its rich coal land holdings, is a valuable possession. It was a big dividend payer from the start, and it is really the Rio Grande Western which made the Western Pacific a possibility, and which is now making the Salt Lake-Ogden project a reality. With the new line built, the Rio Grande Western will be ready to lose its identity under the title of the Western Pacific.

The Gould system of railroads is to have a strong trans-continental line with steamship connections, to compete with Harriman interests.

**FAST MILEAGE.** With the Western Pacific completed, Gould will have over 17,000 miles of railroad, traversing twenty-three states. As early as 1903, Gould admitted that he had some day to effect a huge consolidation of all his lines. The "some day" would be that day which saw all his lines completed.

The Pacific Pacific is Gould's biggest and latest venture. This is to be completed in about a year, so the first step Gould will make toward realizing his dream of several years will be the consolidation of the two lines.

An issue of \$15,000,000 worth of bonds will be agreed upon by both companies. Of this sum probably \$8,000,000 will be used to pay the indebtedness of the merging concerns and the remainder will be used for necessary improvements. Blair & Co. and the other firms which underwrote the \$500,000 bond issue of the Western Pacific will advance between \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000 to the Rio Grande so it can make good the deficiency in the sum raised for the construction of the Western Pacific and will receive in return more bonds of the merger issue.

With such steps as these coming, it is natural that members of the banking firms should be traveling over the Gould lines. With bonds placed, plenty of money to push all work ahead will have been obtained and the wonderful transformations worked about Harriman terminals here will be duplicated around the Gould terminal a bit to the south.

The officers also found card markers and poker chips, all of which indicated a kind of "game" which had been run and what chance a "sucker" with money had to win.
