

The official tentative program for the congress which has finally been agreed upon by the executive committee of the bureau of American republics is now made public for the first time. shows that only four general subjects will be especially urged on the congress for consideration. They are, First, arbitration.

Second, International court of claims. Third, measures for the protection of industry, agriculture and commerce. Development of the means of communication between the countries composing the union. Consular, port and customs regulations, statistics

Fourth, re-organization of the international bureau of American republics. By the terms of this program it is left optional with the congress as to whether its action on the subject of arbitration shall be retroactive as demanded by Peru and Bolivia, or shall be confined strictly to future disputes, as contended for by Chili.
