Thus there should be a limit to the size of individual deposits and when that limit is reached interest should cease. "Under such a system again the banks and bankers will profit in the end, for the man, woman or child end, for the man, woman or child who has saved \$750 to \$1,000 in a postal sevings bank must necessarily find some investment for that fund and a large part of these depoists will find their way into savings hanks owing to the attraction of the high er interest offered.'
