Member is Amputated.—It was found necessary to amputate the foot of Gordon L. Hutchins at St. Mark's hospital yesterday afternoon, in consequence of its being crushed under the wheels of a street car earlier in the day.

BAILEY IS NAMED ON SCHOOL BOARD

Judge Henry P. Henderson Submits His Name to Succeed Joseph Oberndorfer.

MAY RESCIND THE CONTRACT.

Vander Horst Brothers Have Been Dilatory in Their Work at the Jefferson School.

Ledyard M. Bailey, manager of the Portland Utah Cement company, was unanimously chosen a member of the board of education last night to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Joseph Oberndorfer. His name was placed before the board by Judge H. P. Henderson, who was granted the usual custom of naming a colleague to fill a vacancy. Mr. Bailey and Judge Henderson are the representatives of the Fifth ward.

After the business of the special meeting had been transacted, Judge Henderson addressed the chairman and the name of Mr. Bailey in a brief speech. Since he has been considering an appointment, he said, that eight names had been submitted to him one of which would have satisfied him and filled the position. Mr. Bailey has taken an interest in educational affairs, he said, and he believed that he would be a good addition to carry on the work of the board.

When the chairman asked the members to vote on Judge Henderson's appointment, it was unanimous. The minutes of the clerk were made to show that a vote was cast and the ballots show that Mr. Bailey was the choice of the board members.

MAY RESCIND CONTRACT.

Because the Vander Horst Bros., contractors, have been dilatory in beginning work on the Jefferson school building, which is to be erected on the Walker site, the board of education may rescind the contract.

Mr. Bailey has been informed by the board that the contract is to be given to another contractor to start the work.

EASY PAYMENT TERMS.

Yale locks were ordered to be placed on the doors of the store rooms of each building and the principal to have one key and the clerk of the building the other. This is the result of the investigation which was recently instituted for tracing a few tools which were lost or misplaced.

On the recommendation of the building and grounds committee, the board decided to increase the thickness of the concrete of the new Jefferson school on account of the unstable soil. This cement will be reinforced with steel rails. The additional estimated cost was \$4,500. C. O. Bonnerud was appointed as inspector of cement at a salary of \$4 a day.

CAMP'S LAKE Residents to Issue Bonds To Provide for 2,000 Acres.

The property owners on Camp's Lane will have a drainage district, under the act passed two years ago by the legislature. At the special election held yesterday, only one vote out of the 44 property owners was cast.

David M. Whitaker, Andrew E. Gandy and James Gibson were selected trustees to raise the necessary funds and start the work on the drainage project. The estimated cost was \$4,500.
