Grocers Assign—The independent grocery company, 74 West Fifth South street, has made an assignment to the Utah Credit Men's association, for the benefit of its creditors, with liabilities of \$2,500, and assets at about \$2,000.

Member Is Amputated—It was found necessary to amputate the foot of Gordon L. Hutchins at St. Mark's hospital yesterday afternoon, in consequence of the injury caused under the wheel of a street car earlier in the day.

Wool Market Good—F. C. Jensen of Mt. Pleasant is in the city. He says Utah sheep have wintered well, and the wool is in good condition. Practically all the wools from Modena to Idaho have been sold from 15 to 17 cents with a solid market.

BAILEY IS NAMED SCHOOL BOARD

Judge Henry P. Henderson Submits His Name to Succeed Joseph Oberndorfer.

MAY RESCIND THE CONTRACT.

Vonder Horst Brothers Have Been Dilatory in Their Work at the Jefferson School.

Ledyard M. Bailey, manager of the Portland Utah Cement company, was unanimously chosen a member of the board of education last night to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Joseph Oberndorfer. His name was placed before the board by Judge H. P. Henderson, who was granted the usual custom of naming a colleague to fill a vacancy. Mr. Bailey and Judge Henderson are the representatives of the fifth ward.

After the business of the special meeting had been transacted, Judge Henderson addressed the chairman and presented the name of Mr. Bailey in a brief speech. Since he has been considering an appointment, he said, eight names had been submitted to him any one of which would have satisfied him and filled the position. Mr. Bailey has taken an interest in the educational affairs, he said, and he believed that he would be a useful member to carry on the work of the board.

When the chairman asked the members to vote on Judge Henderson's appointment, it was unanimous. The minutes of the clerk were made to show that a vote was cast and the ballots show that Mr. Bailey was the choice of the board members.

MAY RESCIND CONTRACT.

Because the Vonder Horst Bros., contractors, have been dilatory in beginning work on the Jefferson school building, which is to be erected on the Walker sight, the board of education may rescind the contract. For weeks little excavating has been done, and the building has been delayed. As the building is needed for the opening of school work after vacation, it is believed that the contractors will be unable to finish it on August 1, as agreed in the contract. The contract awarded to the Vonder Horst Bros. amounts to \$71,000 and includes everything except the plumbing and heating.

No locks are ordered to be placed on the doors of the store rooms of each building and the principal to have one key and the clerk of the board the other. This was the result of the investigation, which was recently instituted for tracing a few tools which were lost or misplaced.

L. P. Christensen was re-employed as leader of the high school band and Capt. Webb as instructor of the high school cadets.

On the recommendation of the board and grounds committee the board decided to increase the thickness of the basement of the new Jefferson school on account of the unstable soil. This cement will be reinforced with steel rails. The additional estimated cost was \$400. C. O. Bonner was appointed as an inspector of cement at a salary of \$6 a day.

TO HAVE DRAINAGE DISTRICT. Camp's Lane Residents to Issue Bonds To Provide for 2,000 Acres.

The property owners on Camp's Lane will have a drainage district, under the act passed two years ago by the legislature. At the special election held yesterday, only one vote out of the 44 property owners was cast against it.

David M. Whitaker, Andrew E. Gidke and James Gibson were selected trustees to raise the \$100,000 bond and start the work at once. One canal is now already constructed in the vicinity and the city has a pump installed at 32½ West and Fourteenth North streets to carry away the surface waters.

To raise the funds the trustees are authorized to sell the property under the state law.
