ANNUAL STATE ART EXHIBIT.

Summons of the Reaper—Escaped Prisoner Recaptured.

Richfield, Sevier Co., Dec. 6.—John E. Solomon of this city died here on the 2nd inst. of tuberculosis and cancer of the stomach.

Deceased was born in Sweden, in 1843, and went to Denmark in 1865, where he later joined the Church. He immigrated to Utah in 1890, and settled in Levan. A year later he removed to Richfield, where he has since resided. He performed missionary labor in Denmark until 1903, and was then always been a faithful Latter-day Saint. He leaves a wife and four sons. The funeral occurred at the First ward meetinghouse at 3 p. m. today.

Joseph Lester Christensen, son of Simon and Bertha M. Christensen, of this city died here on the 4th inst. of dropsy, the out-growth of an accident received several years ago from being run over by a loaded wagon which paralyzed the lower part of his body, and from which he never recovered. He was 19 years of age. His father, Elder Simon Christensen is now on a mission in Denmark.

The funeral occurred from the Third ward meetinghouse at noon today.

A death is also reported in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Heber M. Ogden, of this city. Their little two-year-old son died of a complication of diseases and was buried Dec. 1.

J. P. Jensen of Monroe, escaped from the county jail here several days ago, was again apprehended in the foot hills near Monroe last Friday night.

His brother, who is supposed to have assisted him to escape was followed to his hiding place whether he had gone with food and other things for the prisoner's comfort.

They were both brought to Richfield and placed in jail.
