## A SUPPOSED EVIL OMEN.

The Letter "B" Imprinted Upon the Leaves of Oaks.

It is said to stand for Blandness, and appeared before the War of 1812 and the Civil War.

June 24, June 27.—Many people are mysteriously agitated over a mysterious circumstance which is thought to indicate disaster. It is the appearance of the letter "B" plainly imprinted upon the leaf of oak growing in fields. Across and across in all parts of the country have been found to be the commonly marked, and it is no wonder that imaginative persons can associate the presence of the letter with foreboding of evil. It is estimated that the only other time the letter was ever found on oak leaves in this country was just before the war of 1812 and the Civil War, and that the "B" stands for "Blandness," which may now be feared for again. Each leaf is marked, the letter about half an inch across, being as it seems, pressed into the leaf and discolored on the other side. Some say that the phenomenon occurs frequently, but some explain its origin.

### A Convicted Killer.

ROBERT EMMETT, O. T., June 27.—Mr. Hutton, consular of North Elmwood, was shot and instantly killed tonight. It is not known who did the killing, but it is likely the result of the town's fight. ### Intense Riotous Reception.

CHARLESTON, S. C., June 27.—A number of Lower South Blues concluded that they wished to visit their brethren at the lower agencies, so they left their reservations without the necessary permission. A strong force of Indian police is now in close contact and will force them to return to their reservation.

### Will Continue the Reception.

MOBILE, ALA., June 27.—The uppers here have decided to continue the reception by a vote of 219 to 19. The Madison company tried to get enough men to operate their mine but failed. As the consolidated coal company and the Madison company, who own the mine here, have been the most obstinate to recognize the miners' demands the men do not like to go up.

### The Pullman Boycott.

CHICAGO, June 27.—The threatened strike to end the boycott of Pullman cars was inaugurated at a public meeting, when the American Railway Union ordered the Illinois Central out. The strikers were the first to stop, and quickly walked out, leaving the suburban, as well as express, trains in operation. The 9 o'clock train for St. Louis was allowed to pull out, as it was made up this morning, before the boycott went into effect, but that train the men asserted was the last that would be allowed to go out until the Pullman strike was settled.

### Overcome by Heat.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Senator Palmer was overcome by the heat this afternoon, and was forced to retire from the chamber, but declared he expects to be in hand again tomorrow.

### The Taylor Brothers.

They Fought Their Innocence of the Crime with which They are Charged.

KANSAS CITY, June 26.—A Star Grand Jury Little Rock, Ark., gave the following interview with William P. Taylor, one of the brothers in custody there for the murder of the Stokes family at Newburg, Mo. "We are entirely guiltless of the crime and had intended leaving on a ship for Europe and returning home by that. We expect to leave for St. Louis tomorrow night. We hope to get out and give in in any summary way if necessary."

### HEAVEN BY A HOR.

Interviewed Postponed Take the Law in Their Own Hands.

CHICAGO, June 26.—William Pinkerton, a married man, 25 years of age, lies in a hospital tonight at the point of death, the victim of an infanticide. The woman who killed him cannot be held for trial. Pinkerton, with another young man named Michael Brown, was in trial this morning for committing rape on a young Lithuanian woman named Anna Brown. The alleged assault occurred Friday night of last week. According to the woman's statement she and a half-brother were going by the Rock Island

depot when the two women entered them to throw up their hands and go to jail. They were taken to an isolated location. There the man was kept under observation with a revolver, while the women were released.

Just as the prosecution was about to close its case a large crowd of Lithuanians, who were waiting to see the trial, broke down the door to the dock and released the two men.

Brown managed to escape into a rear room, while Pinkerton escaped from a second story window and ran. The angry mob pursued him to the garage house of St. J. street, where he had hidden in an unoccupied room. He was dragged out, and beaten until he was unconscious. The mob dragged him out in the car and let him go, thinking he was dead.

When he began to show signs of life the crowd urged the outraged women to beat him. Striking a gas handkerchief the man went for the gas handkerchief. For hours the angry crowd kept beating him. When a doctor tried to examine him the Lithuanians started him and compelled him to run for his life.

Not until night did Pinkerton's friends venture to carry him home to his wife and family, who are greatly with grief. Brown was taken to a hospital, but is badly wounded. The crowd is still beating him tonight.

### THE DENVER CONVENTION.

Forty States and Territories Represented at Roll Call.

Resolutions Introduced, Speeches and Letters of Regret-The Plans of the Next Meeting.

DENVER, June 26.—The roll call following immediately after the president's address, showed forty states and territories represented, the largest number in the history of the organization. Some of the delegations were very large. Iowa reported 24, Kansas 21, Minnesota 20, Mississippi 10, Wyoming 10 delegates, and 11 visitors.

When Oregon was called, the chairman answered, "there, with 10,000 majority." Vermont answered, "there, with 20,000 majority."

When the United resolution came up objection was made on the ground that the President of the United States had already expressed his sympathy for himself and the American people. A delegate stated that Governor Cleveland did not represent all the people of the United States. This remark caused the President of the United States to be called to the floor.

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2000. The report was adopted without discussion. The league was then invited by the chairman of the Minneapolis delegation to hold the next convention in Minneapolis, and a similar invitation from Cleveland, O., was read. After an extended address by ex-Congressman Shuman on "Legislation in the South," the convention adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow.

The committee on resolutions demanded tonight, to recommend that the next convention be held at Des Moines, Ia. The final vote was 100 to 10 in favor of Des Moines.

The committee on rules will report tomorrow in favor of allowing each state to cast the full vote in which it is entitled, regardless of the number of delegates present. A minority report opposing this plan will be presented.
