EASTERN.

Indicted for Murder.

BALTIMORE, 25.—John F. Gorham, 25, indicted to-day for the murder of Alon G. Emma, A. and Melle Gordon, at Thorndyke, in June last.

Arrested.

BALTIMORE, 25.—Alexander T. Holmes, bookkeeper for Hardy Bros., commission merchants, has been arrested on a charge of forgery.

400 Out of Employment.

NEW YORK, 25.—The Newark Steam Mill, owned by Garner & Co., of New York, have stopped, throwing four hundred persons out of employment.

Closed indefinitely.

CORDES, N. Y., 25.—The Harney cotton mills, the largest of kind in the world, closed to-night indefinitely.

Fleeing for Their Lives.

BAIRNSIDE, Ga., 25.—Many negroes, who had been slaves, have been reported this evening, the dangerous cases reported better this morning relapsed, and the deaths of the patients are hourly expected. The negroes leaving the city crowded with fleeing people, and vehicles cannot be had for love or money. The weather is warm, with indications of rain.

Silver to be put in Circulation—Starved to Death.

NEW YORK, 25.—A Washington dispatch says the amount of silver to be coined to-morrow will be between two and three hundred thousand dollars, and should the demand exceed this, the Secretary will issue more.

The man, who had been locked up in Jersey City, since July last, for killing Eugene Atens, in a quarrel with his wife, has died from starvation.

Silver Resumption.

The proposed resumption of silver payment by the treasury caused many applications to-day, at the Treasury, for the conversion of currency into gold. The assistant treasurer has not yet received any instructions from Washington. A prominent officer of the mint, however, said that over one thousand ounces of fine silver in the city early in the week, and forwarded it to the mint at Philadelphia. This amount would furnish about 124,000 dollars, the difference being composed of some small details allowing to coin the silver dollar, and making the value of the coin to the government no greater than 124,000 dollars. The mint officials were unaware of the purchase of the silver, he did not think it could have taken place without his knowledge.

Help to Memphis.

The firemen have sent another five hundred dollars to the Memphis committee. Memphis merchants have contributed a total collection of \$24,000.

No Story.

The trial of Nathaniel Britton, for the murder of John A. Kane, in June last, was concluded to-day, with a verdict of "not guilty."

The Kasey Case.

The Kasey business has been dismissed, and the court's jury finding that Chas. G. Kasey came to his death by brutal treatment on the night of November 4th, 1872, at the hands of some persons unknown, referred the case to the grand jury, the result of which was a verdict of "murder."

Programmes of Spanish Government.

President Castellar in a recent conversation with prominent Spanish leaders stated that the world considered him a traitor, and military men in the army, no matter what might be their political creed or antecedents, and announced the following, as the programme of the government: First, the regularization of the army, and complete reorganization of its disciplines; second, a settlement of the dispute with the colonial governments, which was now nearly at an end; third, finishing on the coast, continued to the interior, the war, which was then almost at an end, especially in Catalonia; fourth, the maintenance of the power of the state in order to return to the hands of the Cortes on the 2nd of January next, just as it was vacated; fifth, giving a guarantee to all classes of society within the limits of the existing regulation for security and public order.

"The Beautiful Snow."

CHICAGO, 25.—Reports from various points of Central and Western Wisconsin and Minnesota say that snow fell about noon to-day to a depth of four inches.

Cutted by Fire.

HARFORD, Conn., 25.—The western half of the City Hall was completely gutted by fire to-night.

Arrested for Forgery.

KELMORE, 25.—Dale W. Wilson, formerly secretary of several building associations in the city, was arrested at Erie, Pa., and brought here on Friday last, on a charge that he had forged a bill of exchange on city banks having been found against him, said to amount to \$1,000.

Yellow Fever Mortuary.

MEMPHIS, 25.—The mortuary report of the yellow fever shows 23 cases, and from the beginning of the month to date, 112 cases. Four of the cases were the deaths of yellow fever, were one hundred and sixty-nine; from other causes, thirty-four. The decrease from the week previous from yellow fever was 100 cases, or 70 per cent. Notwithstanding the unfavorable weather, the reports from all sources are very promising this afternoon. Ships have effected a landing, and the yellow fever cases, so far as known, have been in a day or two of the increased death list.

Admitted to Bell.

YANKTON, Dakota, 25.—Winter, who shot Gen. Edwin M. Stanton, while in the President's office, was admitted to the hospital of manslaughter, and was admitted to Bell in the sum of \$1,000.
