The formal plan provides for the incorporation of a new company with the following capitalization: Preferred stock 6 per cent cumulative \$15,000,000, common stock, \$24,000,000; 5 per cent 100-year debentures \$25,000,000-a total of \$64,000,000. Of the authorized com-mon stock the plan provides that \$8,-000,000 shall be issued on acquisition of property and in part payment therefor as fully paid stock and \$16,000,000 is to be assessable stock on which 10 per cent is to be called at time of issue and payable at such date or dates as may be made by the organization committee, the balance payable as called by the board of directors, but not more than 10 per cent to be called in any one year, unless consent of a majority of such \$16,000,000 of assessable stock is given, The committee of the New Jersey Zine company consists of Stephen S. each one of these wars, not excepting the infamous opium war, had its origin in the commercial spirit and in the de termination of foreigners to force trade upon China. The present war, the late war, the Boxer revolution, in a measure, may have been also due to the same cause and to the same pressure. The people of China, you must understand, are desperately poor. Their per capita output is, perhaps, less than that of any civilized nation the world. But the American, the English, the French and the Germans-all nationalities—have been pressing upon them for trade. The poor people them-selves have not known what was the matter, why they were in this dis-tressed condition, why things seemed to be so bad with them, why they were so poor; and, knowing that they were poor they have not appreciated why foreigners were so eager to establish commen cial and closer relations with them. I will not undertake to dwell upon the causes of that poverty or of the changes that have been brought about in China, but I say to you, compre hensively, that the cause of the difficulty in China is the distressful condition which has surrounded the people and in their anxiety to find some cause of explanation of it, they have taken the first thing that presented itself.

### THE PRESENT DIFFICULTIES. Speaking of the present difficulties in

## Stabbed to Death.

New York, Feb. 8 .- Chas. Yost was stabbed over the heart last night by Fred Hoffmann, a groceryman in Hoffmann's store. Yost managed to get to his home, where he died in his wife's arms. Hoffmann was arrested.

According to the story told by the police, Mrs. Hamill, Mrs. Yost's sisterin-law, went into Hoffmann's store to make a purchase. Mrs. Hoffmann, the wife of the grocer, was behind the counter and she deducted from the money tendered in payment the sum of 25 cents, which she claimed was owed by Mrs. Yost. Mrs. Hamill objected to paying her sister-in-law's alleged bill. Hamill went to the store and demanded the money. Yost soon ar-rived on the scene. The grocer made an effort to get Hamill and Yost to leave the place but they refused. In a strug-gle Yost was stabbed just over the gle heart.
