### Were Employed on Vanderbilt's Summer Residence "Idle Hour."

New York, March 22 .- Delegates from the building trades unions of New York City have been to Oakdale, L. L. to order out about one hundred mechanics who were employed on William K. Vanderbilt's summer residence "Idle Hour." In consequence seventy-five of the workmen came back to Manhattan. and those who lived in the vicinity re-turned to their homes and work on the uilding came to a standstill. The trouble arose from the fact that the principal contractor sub-let the steam-piping to a plumber who does not em-ploy union men. The carpenters and ecorators remained at work, but expect orders from their unions to leave the job at once. Mr. Vanderbilt was endeavoring by the employment of a large force of men to have "Idle Hour" ready for company this summer. ## CONDITION OF NATIONAL BANKS Controller of Currency Will Soon

### Publish a Statement.

New York, March 21 .- A special to the Tribune from Washington says: The controller of the currency will soon publish a complete statement of reports from all the national banks in the United Stats. As this statement made in answer to the first call for 1961, the results are being awaited with much interest. The time between December 13 and February 5, the date of the call, is said in industrial circles to be the duil season. But figures al-ready obtained from abstracts reflect surprisingly large gains as compared with the previous statement which was a record-breaker.

The aggregate resources of the 385 banks in New York State, as shown by the controller's accounts, are \$206,159,-556, which is \$226,961 less than the amount recorded in December, but is substantially greater than the figures of the first statement in 1900, which

#### More Coast Artillery.

Washington, March 21 .-- Under the army reorganization law, which pro-vides for an increase of 20 per cent of the artillery arm of the service, an order has been issued authorizing twelve companies of coast artillery in addi-tion to those now in service. These ad-ditional companies are to be filled by transfers from other companies and recruited up to 113 men and will be or-ganized as former batteries of slege artillery were organized.

#### STOCK EXCHANGE DECISION.

### Court Holds Member's Seat Could Not be Sold to Pay for a Debt.

New York, March 22 -- Judge Leventritt of the supreme court has rendered a decision which is adverse to the New York stock exchange in the case New of Henry C, Bernheim as administra-tor of Abraham C. Bernheim vs Adoiph Keppler as president of the exchange, The history of the case is as follows Abraham Bernheim was a member of the stock exchange and died a member. Upon his death the stock exchange committee sold his seat and appropriated the proceeds in payment of a debt owed by him to another member, J. Levy & Co. But the debt, amounting to \$18,000, had been contracted before Bernheim became a member of the exchange. The exchange committee applied the proceeds of the sale of this debt under an article of the constitution of the exchange, Counsel for the plaintiff contended that the proceeds of the sale could not be applied to the debt because the debt was not con-tracted between members of the institution. The defendant was necessar-ily President Keppler because the exexchange is not an incorporated institution. The litigation was begun in 1897, and argument was made before Judge Leventritt in November last. His decision is important since, it is unerstood, this is the first court decision in the history of the State construing the section referred to.

Carnegie on Consolidations.

London, March 21 .- To an English inerviewer, after his arrival in London Mr. Carnegie talked freely concerning the United States Steel corporation, which he thought would not affect Great Britain much one way or the other. "I think there is no fear," sale

Mr. Carnegie, "that the corporation's surplus stock will be sold abroad at less than cost, or that the corporation hopes to slaughter the steel trade of Great Britain.

Asked whether the existence of trusts did not tend toward national bankruptcy, or whether they might not prove a step in an evolution toward socialism, Mr. Carnegie said:

"The man behind the trusts is just as important as ever. Consolidations are the tendency of our age, and will prove beneficial. The chances of Andrew Carnegie, if he landed a penniless boy in New York tonight, would be as bright as they were in 1848, and he would have even a wider field."

When asked whether the people of America were not likely to pass strin-gent anti-trust legislation, Mr. Car-negle said no. He thought the tariff was a back number for many things having done its work. "But," he added "where it is still needed you may rely it will be freely used."

Unfortunately this dispute is only an isolated instance of the friction of in-terests between the two powers. The other instances have not obtained such prominence.

This ship-ment is said to be for experimental purposes and it is not the intention of the company to operate a regular tank service from Texas at present. The oil was shipped from Beaumont, Texas,
